W. W. organizers among the men, and if there had been delay, these men would have said that the American ederation of Labor could not do anything, and in consequence, spor-adic strikes would have developed. Following this statement by Tighe, Senator Sterling asked the natural question: "Then, in the last analy-sis, the I. W. W. caused the strike?" The head of the iron, steel and tin workers' union naturally declined to take this view of the situation, or t least he refused to admit that he akes this view, but it will be difficult for general public to take any other, particularly with W. Z. Foser, the syndicalist, one of the principal engineers of the walkout. The fact that I. W. W. organizers were tolerated by the American Federaion itself suggests strongly that thi rganization was not in control of e situation.—Detroit Free Press.
