ROAD COMMISSION COMPLETES SCHEDULE; ASKS FOR \$115,703.

The Kent county road commission Wednesday completed its schedule of road work for next year and filed its request with the board of supervisors for \$115,703.36 to be spread through a half mill per dollar tax on the assessed valuation of the county for the year 1918. The request of the commission that the amount be included in the budget for the coming year will be considered by the supervisors at a special session to be held in the court house next Tuesday morning.

Following are the projects for which appropriations are asked: Algoma-Sparta road, commencing at the center of section 5, Algoma township, thence north, \$18,000; Walker-Sparta road, commencing at the corner of sections 7, 8, 17 and 18, Sparta township, thence north, \$21,000; Courtland road, commencing at the Shaw creek bridge, on section 30, Courtland township, thence north and east, \$18,000; Nelson road, commencing at the corner of sections 26, 27, 34 and 35, Courtland township, thence west, \$12,000; Spencer road, commencing at the east eighth corner on the south line of section 20, Spencer township, thence north and east, \$7,500; Burton street, commencing at the intersection of Madison avenue and the south city limit, thence east, \$25,000; state trunk line participation, Alpine avenue, \$14,203.36.—Grand Rapids Herald, Oct. 16.

OLD CIVIL WAR VETERAN GONE

William F. Smith Answers Last Roll Call. Burial Here Monday.

Another veteran of the Civil war answers to the call of the roll by the Great Commander. Comrade William F. Smith, late of Co. E., 50th Ohio Volunteer Infantry, died at his home in Vergennes township, October 10, 1919, aged 81 years and 6 months.

Commander Smith was enrolled in the Union army October 1, 1861 at Vermilion, Ohio, and discharged December 31, 1864 at Savannah, Ga., having served a period of more than three years.

He left to mourn their loss his wife, an aged sister-in-law and several nieces and nephews. His brother, who was also a veteran of the Civil war, preceded him.

Comrade Smith was for some years a member of Joseph Wilson Post of Lowell. For the past few years the journey from his home to the Post rooms was too much for him, for which reason he dropped his membership. Comrade Smith was well known to many of our citizens.

He was honest, industrious and loyal; a genuine American. The majority of his old comrades of the war have gone before. Soon the last of them will receive the call that summoned him.

He loved his home. He was a loving husband, a kind neighbor and a good citizen.

COUNTY BUDGET FAR OVER DRAWN

Next Year's Allotment Must Be Large to Provide for Excess Drafts.

The budget for Kent county for the year 1920 will have to include an appropriation sufficiently large to care for the overdrafts which were existing at the end of the year, it was shown Thursday morning when W. A. Riley, deputy county treasurer, presented his report of the county's financial condition to the county board of auditors. The report showed that overdrafts in the budget appropriations now total \$172,061.55, but it is explained a large amount of this overdraft is merely temporary, that is, existing only until proper transfers from other funds can be made.

The board of auditors will hold the report and will meet with the budget and finance committee of the board of supervisors, check over the figures presented and will make up the budget for next year, using this report as a basis. This is the first year the county has been under the budget system. Deputy Treasurer Riley has completed a large task in getting away from the old system of accounting in vogue at the county building and putting the accounts upon the present departmental budget system. The new system of accounting was made particularly difficult because of the large number of salubrious accounts and other items that could not properly be classed under budget heads.

Use Roads Money.

After checking over the report which the auditors received Thursday it was shown that although the balance on the credit side of the ledger stands at \$27,180.10 in favor of the county about \$320,000 of this belongs to the county good roads and the Covert act fund. Last year the county borrowed \$75,000 from the Covert fund to make up the deficit then existing. It is believed that this year the same procedure will have to be gone through with, although the sum that will be borrowed undoubtedly will not be so large.

The supervisors at the October session last year made appropriations of \$82,675.96 as the amount to be raised by taxation to take care of the county's expenses. To this amount was added \$58,500, which it was estimated would accrue from the fees and taxes on the roads.

Up to the supervisors. Because the report to the auditors covers only nine months the supervisors next week will estimate the amount of money that will be needed to run the county until the first of the year and then will make provisions for defraying the running expenses for next year. The straightened condition of the county treasury will be relieved somewhat early in December when payments of the state and county tax collected will be received from the city treasurer and some of the township treasurers.

The details of the Riley report shows that the county treasury has overdrafted its account \$1,430,941. The poor department, however, has not overdrafted its account because it has a balance of \$9,462.01 more than enough to take care of the primary over-draft and leave a balance besides.

The contagious disease fund already is overdrafted \$7,505.96. The good roads general fund shows an overdraft of \$73,808.82. This exists at the present time although it will be greatly reduced when the good roads department makes transfers from funds under its control which are included in the general fund of the good roads commission. For the sake of convenience, it has been pointed out, the road commission has found it necessary to use the general fund of the county to cover the overdraft. There will be an overdraft at the end of the year in this fund.

The miscellaneous account shows an overdraft of \$29,373.68. This overdraft comes generally from the payment of old bills and accounts which were due to the treasurer's office, to be paid to establish the new accounting system. It also takes care of a large number of other accounts which cannot properly be placed in the departmental accounts.

Shortages of Leroy E. Smith, missing cashier in the treasurer's office, are shown in the Riley report to be \$2,497.75 and fully covered by the bonding companies.—Grand Rapids Press.


