SHOWS HOW COUNTY MAY SAVE DOLLARS.

Secretary Hatten Submits Statistics Revealing Waste of Taxpayers' Money.

That a county purchasing agent could save thousands of dollars to Kent county taxpayers, was the argument advanced in communication sent to the board of supervisors Monday by Secretary Hatten of the Grand Rapids Citizens League. Accompanying the communication was a table showing the difference between the buying prices of the city, which has a purchasing agent, and the county's supply prices.

According to Hatten's statistics the average percentage of increase paid by the county over the city, both high and low prices, is 31.54 per cent. The average percentage of increase paid by the county over the city at low prices is 30.22 per cent. The average percentage of increase paid by the county over city, in high prices, is 32.86 per cent.

Since Jan. 1, 1919, the county has spent \$124,777 for supplies, through a purchasing agent.

Hatten points out that the 31.54 per cent increase would be more than enough to pay the salary of a purchasing agent.

Hatten's Communication.

"Prior to and during the last session of the legislature," Hatten's communication reads, "the Citizens League was active in trying to secure a purchasing agent law for Kent county. The Kent delegation finally united, and the legislature passed a law providing for the selection of a full time secretary for the board of auditors, who should be the county purchasing agent."

"This law, before becoming effective, must be approved by the voters of Kent county. To secure data for a campaign of publicity to assure the adoption of the law, and also to check the results, accomplished by the purchasing agent under our commission form of government, Lieut. Russell F. Griffen of the Citizens League staff has made a study of the unit prices prevailing in the city, county and poor departments.

Study Road Expenditures.

This study will be extended to include the road commission and the city board of education, but this portion of the report is completed at this time to be included in the Sentinel, the official organ of the Citizens League, which will be mailed to the members of the league this week.

The League will urge its members and Grand Rapids citizens to vote "yes" on the adoption of the law—Grand Rapids News.
