The hotel keeper at Alto, who served the party with their midnight supper, told Deputies Ralph Bolt and Coney Johnson of the sheriff's department, who went to the scene of the accident just after it had occurred, that there had been no drinking among members of the party and that they had driven away in a perfectly sober condi-

According to Sager, he was driving his car at about 25 miles an hour. He denied rumors that he

was speeding.

When Deputies Bolt and Johnson reached the scene of the accident early in the morning, members of the good roads crew were attempting to rescue the bodies from beneath the wrecked machine. The road crew members, whose shack was nearby, were awakened by the loud crash of the car hitting

by the loud crash of the car hitting the ice on the river, and believed their boiler had exploded.

"The bodies of the three victims were black when we arrived at the scene with Coroner Hilliker," Deputy Bolt declared. "The car had plunged 25 feet before hitting the ice and sinking into the river. A fence of 3-inch thick boards which supported a red lantern, and a cement form used in building abuttments for the new bridge, were carried before the machine into the river."

Girl Blames Sager's Driving. Bolt stated that the Weston girl blamed Sager's fast driving for the accident. He also said that the Petermann girl's clothes had been ripped almost entirely from her body, and that her head was pinned under the boards of the general under the boards of the cement form and the wrecked auto. The car was lifted from the river to release its human prisoners by means of a huge derrick used by the good roads crew. A rope was tied to the girl's body, the last to be rescued to save it from being washed under the ice by the current. Her neck was broken and her skull fractured.

The injured persons were rushed in a private ambulance to Butterworth hospital, where it was stated last night that Mrs, Klevorn's condition was precarious and that she might not survive. Her left arm was fractured and it is feared under the boards of the cement
