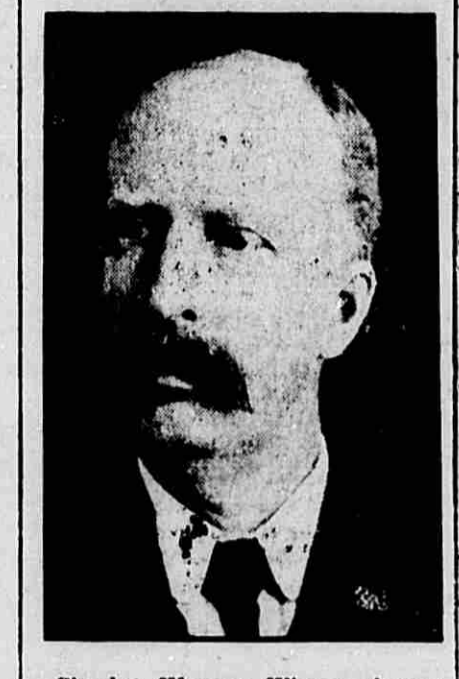

A FLORIDA LETTER

Lowell Man Wintering in the Sunny South Tells About It.

Bradenton, Florida, Jan. 12, 1920. F. M. Johnson, Lowell, Mich. Dear Sir: I am pleased to let you hear from us, so will write you today. We left Lowell on the 9th of December just in time to escape the cold weather you had soon after. And after a slow trip from Chicago to Jacksonville, Florida, we arrived 8 1/2 hours behind the schedule time. This was due to waiting for other trains to convey passengers working their way southward, as owing to cancellation of trains at the time very few trains were running. After stopping at Jacksonville we next went to Tampa where we remained a few days looking over the city and surrounding points of interest. We then went via boat to Bradenton. Passing down Tampa Bay we touched at St. Petersburg docks. Had a fine view of St. Petersburg from the bay. We intended to stop there for a while on our return trip. After leaving St. Petersburg we steamed down the bay twenty-two miles to the mouth of the Manatee river, which is five miles wide at its mouth, then up the river five miles to Bradenton where the river is one mile wide. There is a good bridge across the river, and there is a constant stream of travel across it every day and far into the night. We find Bradenton a very nice place and like it very much. We have had some cold weather for this locality, but everything considered the weather is all we could ask for. We are surely enjoying ourselves. Have all the oranges, tangerines and grape fruit we desire. Have only to go to the orchard and help ourselves, and fish! Talk about fish! We have fish every day and some times every meal, and they are fine eating, and of our own catching too. I see by my diary that we have caught thirty-one fish, which were from one to two feet long. For me, it is great sport. We catch them from off the bridge mentioned over the Manatee river when the tide comes in. Bradenton is the county seat of Manatee county and a rapidly growing city. Population in 1903 was 300. It now has a population of 4,000. Has sixteen miles of paved streets, thirty-two miles of sidewalks, a complete system of sanitary sewers over entire city, five miles of storm sewers, municipally owned water works, fine electric light system, public library, three fruit packing houses, fine High school building, cost \$30,000, county court house \$100,000, Baptist church \$22,000, Presbyterian church \$20,000, city hall \$7,500, passenger station \$7,000, two railroads and a boat line. I think the growth of this place is wonderful. I find there is also a wonderful amount of various crops raised in Florida, and especially in Manatee county. I am sending you a copy of the crop report for the state of Florida, which I took from a report I found in office of the board of trade in Bradenton and of this amount of crops, it is claimed by reliable authority that Manatee county raised one tenth the value of which was estimated at \$115,000,000, which is going some I think. I formed the acquaintance of a gentleman from New York, who shipped the first car load of celery from this county this season. He also bought one acre of celery of a grower for which he paid \$1,825. He to take it as it was growing. This acre of ground will be planted to tomatoes and afterwards to corn, thus getting three crops from same ground within twelve months. Well, I must stop for I have already spun a long tale for a busy editor. If you think a part or all of this I have written would interest the readers of the Ledger, well and good.
