Old Lowell House Found Available for Factory Purposes. When Mayor Fred Green of Ionia, who is also secretary and treasurer of the Ypsilanti Reed Furniture company of that city, was here to attend the Lowell Board of Trade banquet last week, he was induced by Messrs. D. G. Look and M. N. Henry to look at Lowell hotel building, with a view to ascertaining its availability for manufacturing purposes. Since that time several of Mr. Green's representatives have inspected the property and, we understand, stated that it was large enough to accommodate a factory employing a hundred people. The Ypsilanti Reed Furniture company is the concern that recently established and is successfully operating a branch factory at Saranac and is the largest concern of its kind in the world. In its Ionia factories 1500 hands are employed at good wages. The Lowell hotel building is badly out of repair; but it is hoped that the owners will make price inducements that will make its use feasible for factory purposes.

SCHOOLS MAY MERGE CITIES, TAKE NOTICE. Meeting at Alto Unanimous in Favor of Such Action. The most definite and deliberate step in the direction of the consolidation of rural schools in Kent county was taken at Alto Thursday night at a meeting of school officers and residents of the eight school districts in Bowne township. More than 150 persons gathered at the Grange hall and sentiment from every district favored the immediate adoption of the consolidation plan. It was unanimously voted to circulate a petition asking the township board to bring the proposition before the voters at the spring election. If this is carried it will be possible later for the township school to come under county supervision as provided by the agricultural rural school act whereby material benefits could be derived from the state.

CITIES, TAKE NOTICE. County Agriculturist Carr Sees Little Hope for Lower Prices. The Washington dispatches seem to take an optimistic view of next season's farm production and forecast reduced cost of living as a result of increased planting, said County Agriculturist P. G. Carr Saturday morning. "In theory the prices for everything raised on the farm ought to stimulate production, but the swivel chair theorists overlook one very important factor in farm activities and this is the matter of labor. The farmers of the country have been right up against it for help and the prospects are that instead of improving, conditions will be worse than ever the coming season. "The cities are bidding higher and higher for labor and farm help is more and more going to the cities for employment at high wages and short hours. As the situation stands the farmers who are in middle life or beyond, with their places paid for and their sons perhaps gone to the city, will put their lands into pastures or into crops that can be handled with a minimum of labor. "There may be an increase in hay and some of the grains, but the cultivated crops like potatoes, corn and beans will show reduced acreage and corresponding reduction in production. The farmers may be ever so willing, but there is a limit to what they can do and if the cities take their help away the cities must go short of the things the farmers produce. "This is not a theory, it is cold fact. The farmer is not the only one suffering from lack of help. The gardeners are finding it increasingly difficult to obtain labor and for this reason Grand Rapids and every other city can look for high prices next summer for the garden products.
