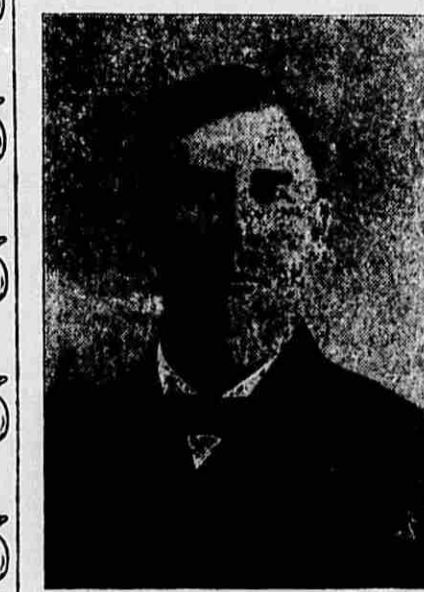

REV. HUSTED DEAD

Former Lowell Pastor Died Monday in Grand Rapids.



Rev. John T. Husted, pastor of the Lowell Congregational church from November 1884 to July 1888 died Monday at his home, 3318 Plainfield Ave., Grand Rapids, after a long illness, aged 76 years.

Mr. Husted was a popular preacher, a strong fraternalist and a good mixer with men.

He was widely known as the "Marrying parson," having united 3,500 couples; but he also officiated at 4,000 funerals, received about 3,000 people into the church, and preached nearly 8,000 sermons.

Surviving are the widow, three sons, Lemuel J., of Kansas City, Mo.; Seneca J., of Detroit and Chas. of New York City; and one daughter, Mrs. Lucia Gwiltin, of Muskegon, 10 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

Another daughter, Mrs. Anna Stone, well known in Lowell, died several years ago.

PATTERSON CLEARED IN THE LONG AGO

Pratt Lake and Kilgus Drain Contracts Declared Void.

Sweeping aside all charges of fraud on the part of County Drain Commissioner Robert B. Patterson, Judge John S. McDonald, on Wednesday, held the contract with the Woolman Construction company, of Sandusky, for construction of the Pratt Lake and Kilgus drains is void, but sustained the contract as it applies to the erection of bridges over these drains by the Beach Manufacturing company, of Charlevoix.

The case, submitted by the attorneys without argument, is of particular importance in all drain matters as in his decision, Judge McDonald outlined a rule that a drain commission cannot reject at its pleasure any bid for drain construction.

Used Regulation Form. In his notice for bids for the drain, Commissioner Patterson used a blank prepared by the attorney general's department in which it is stated the commissioner reserved the right to reject any and all bids.

Patterson, as a result, claimed this right, and so has Commissioner D. S. Holmes, under the law, did not possess the power to arbitrarily say that Charles H. Montague, of Otsego, who underbid the Woolman Construction company, was not a responsible bidder.

There must be some substantial facts on which to fix this decision, the court added. In this case it was shown that Montague had put up a check for \$1,000 as evidence of his good faith.

It is likely that the case will be carried to the supreme court, it was stated by Commissioner Patterson.

Attorneys R. M. Shivel and Chas. E. Ward, represented Lowell and Bowne townships in the case.

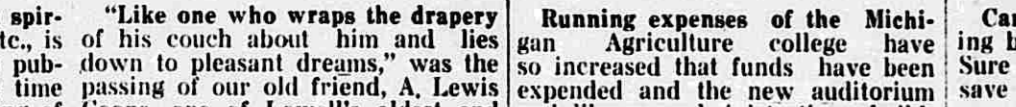

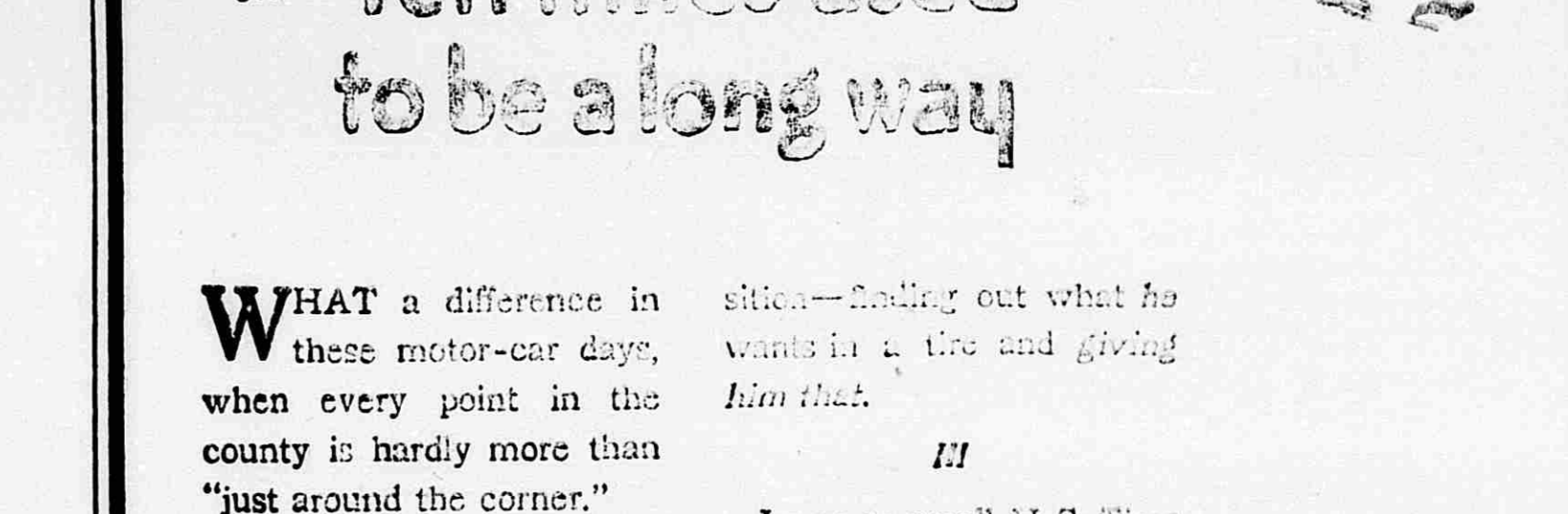
