**SPRINGLING HOURS.**

Editor The Ledger:

Being one of the patrons of the Lowell water system, it seems pertinent to ask a few general questions as to the real reasons for fixing the hours for springling so early in the afternoon.

I get home about seven o'clock, and the sun is shining hot on my lawn, and I start to sprinkle, and my wife calls to me, with the words, "you cannot sprinkle now, it is past the hour," so I shut the water off, and cuss the water man for having fixed such unreasonable hours for springling.

It is my belief that it is best for lawns not to sprinkle when the sun is shining on them, and have made a "practice in the past of doing this after sundown, but the hours as fixed now would require me to leave my place of business at what would seem like the middle of the afternoon, to do any sprinkling at 5:30 with the clock already set ahead one hour.

Another point I would like to ask about. The reason given for advancing rates 50 per cent with so much increased business having been taken on. Now I supposed the water business paid well in the past at the old rate, and now on account of having so many more patrons it will not pay without increasing the rate 50 per cent. This seems to me inconsistent. However, if my impressions are not well founded, and an explanation should be forthcoming from the manager, or council, or whoever it may be that fixed the sprinkling hours as they now are, I shall be interested to have them reply to this.
