Cummins Apt to Keep His Seat

Senator Albert B. Cummins of Iowa is evidently to have another term in the senate. His present term will expire March 3, 1921. He has been nominated by the Republicans of his state for re-election, and his victory seems to have been comparatively easy. As Iowa went Republican in 1916 by 59,000, and Senator Kenyon was elected in 1918 by a Republican majority of 110,000, Senator Cummins seems reasonably sure of retaining his seat. Senator Cummins lives in Des Moines, is seventy years of age and is a lawyer. His political career began when he was elected to the twentysecond state legislature. He served on the Republican national committee from 1896 to 1900. He became governor in 1902 and served until elected November 24, 1908, to fill a vacancy in the United States senate caused by the death of Senator W. B. Allison, Sinc then he has been in the senate.
