





reduced taxes should be appor-ioned! In other words, the big thing to remember in this move-ment is that it should produce a new efficiency and a new measure of economy and an elimination of wastes and duplications and petty leaks in county government to the end that the whole tax bill of the whole county will be less. Surely such an accomplishment offers bet-ter and more substantial hopes of "lower taxes" to the "townships" than they can possibly get from continued reliance on the success-ful outcome of a political scrap in

the Board of Supervisors! The "townships" are proportionately effected just as much as is the "city" when inquiry discloses gross laxity in the management and expenditures of the authorities handling hundreds of thousands of dollars of county money invested in county roads! The "townships" have proportionately just as much at stake in defalactions as has the "city." The whole truth is that existing forms of county government are so reactionary and so ob-

solete and so unbusinesslike that even the most efficient county offi-cer today confronts insurmountable barriers to maximum service and naximum economies. Surely "the big city editor" plans no injustice to the "townships"— in Kent or any other county—when he merely proposes that the state constitution shall be so amended as to give all the people in a county

the right to try to improve upon such a relic of the "dark ages." The Herald is very glad that the Lowell Ledger—always viligant and always worth-while---has provided the occasion for making this point clear. The "big fish" are not try-ing to "eat the little ones." They are merely endeavoring to make the pool healthy for all "fishes" except suckers.
