Taken in Primary. Goebeck, Mapes, McNaughton, Higbee, Vierever, Win.

Only 321 votes were cast at the Lowell primary election Monday, hardly half what was expected. Of these eighteen voted Democratic, and one Prohibition, the other 300 voting for Republican candidates. The unopposed Democratic candidates from Ferris down received 15 of the 18 votes.

The Lowell vote on Republican candidates follows:

Governor—Glasgow 105, Campbell 70, Mott 33.

Leut. Gov.—Read 148, Scully 101, Congressmen—Mapes, 201; Russell, 71; Wheeler 6.

State Senator—McNaughton 47, McPherson, 247.

Probate Judge—Higbee 174, Watkins 67, Ganser 41.

Prosecuting Attorney—Hoffus 177, Jonkman 51, Wallower 36.

Auditor—Woodworth 166, DeYoung 91.

In the state, former Governor Ferris, of course, was nominated by the Democrats and he will be opposed by Alex. J. Goebeck, who beats Milo D. Campbell, for the Republican nomination.

In Kent county, nearly complete returns gives Mapes 10,350, Russell 4,532, Wheeler 618. Similar results in Ottawa county.

The race between the Macs for state senator was close. McNaughton winning by a few hundred.

Probate Judge Higbee, Sheriff Vierever and Prosecutor Hoffus, all won over their opponents by large votes, Roy Watkins, for Probate judge, casting the largest opposing vote.

Sheriff Vierever 176, Berry 84, McCarthy 34.

For county auditor, Woodworth and Brown are the Republican nominees.
