The post forms are set up on the spot, and four eyebolts are inserted in each of the outer sides, before the concrete is poured. After the concrete has set, the forms are removed, leaving the eyes protruding about one inch. Two pieces of iron rod, or pipe, of the proper length, are obtained and the upper ends squared off, as shown. If pipe is used, the upper end should be plugged with a piece of iron rod. held in place by a rivet or pin. Holes are drilled in each piece to correspond with the fence wires. The rods, or pipes, are inserted into the eyebolts and the fence wires put through the holes and bent over. A wrench is applied to the squared end of the pipe, and the fence is drawn up as tightly as desired; one of the right-angle wrenches, or holders, shown in the insert, is then applied, to prevent the


