Loyally Entertained Merchants' Mutual Benefit Association Tuesday Evening.

The Merchants Mutual Benefit association held its annual meeting at Caledonia Tuesday evening at Caledonia. The association, which is composed of merchants in Lowell, Odessa, Lowell, Alto and Freepport, being represented and over 100 being in attendance.

A line banquet was served by the Eastern Star ladies in the Masonic temple with music by a six-piece orchestra, after which the meeting adjourned to the Masonic lodge rooms, where an enjoyable program was carried out.

Fence can be kept taut and adds to neat appearance of forms—Eyes-None inserted in forms—Before concrete is poured.

A six-inch fence is added stretched tightly across to remain taut, and if it becomes slack, it is not only something of a nuisance to the owner, but rather difficult to stretch again. An easily made tightener, attached to the corners, makes it possible to tighten the fence at any time.

The four posts are set up on the spot, and two eye-bolts are inserted in each of the outer sides, before the concrete is poured. The eye-bolts are placed with a piece of iron rod, holes are drilled in each piece to correspond with the fence wire. The rods, or eye-bolts, are placed in the holes and the fence wire put in place. A wrench is applied to the eye-bolts, and the fence is drawn up as tightly as desired. One of the right-angle wrenches is made of heavy strap iron, long enough to fit over the post, and with a square hole on one end to fit over the post. A piece of bag wire can be attached to the upper end of the wrench. Some fences are made with the lower wire of steel together that it may be necessary to cut every other wire. The fence is put on taut and is not to be touched until the concrete has set.

SICKNESS OUTBREAKS BETRAY MOONSHINERS

STATE POLICE FIND CLUES IN ILLNESS DUE TO DRINKING POISONOUS LIQUOR.

One of the things for which the State Police are constantly on the lookout now is the outbreak of epidemics of illness due to poisoning traceable to the drinking of moonshine liquor. It has been found that the opening of a new illicit still is usually followed by such sickness in the neighborhood and the health reports give valuable clues.

Many of the stills seized are crude affairs and metals are used in their construction which result in the formation of poisonous oxides in the liquor. Still in which tin, zinc and lead are used are sure to produce liquor of a poisonous nature. Even where the stills are made of other metals the ignorance of the amateur distillers often results in making the distilled spirits they produce very deleterious to health.

Among the raids which have resulted from liquor poisoning have been those near Grayling where a number of dangerous stills were found.

THREE ORCHARD ROBBERS PAY FINES IN MUSKOGON

Vincent Keller, Milton Bean and Clarence Ploetling, Muskogon trio, paid fines of twenty dollars and costs each when arraigned before Justice O. G. Clement at Muskogon Heights, when they pleaded guilty to stealing fruit from the orchard of William Ellis, Norton township, Muskogon county farmer. The men were arrested by State Troopers O. G. Marden and Harry Olson of the Grand Rapids department.

Three young women, who accompanied the men, were released. The arrests of the trio came in response to complaints of farmers throughout western Michigan to Captain R. G. Strope of the State constabulary, stating that motorists were stripping their orchards. Captain Strope has assigned men to patrol duty in Kent, Muskogon, Ottawa, Oceansa, Allegan, Van Buren, Berrien, St. Joseph and Cass counties in an attempt to put an end to the "help-yourself" motorist who has caused Michigan farmers heavy losses during recent years.
