WHISKY-SELLERS CHEAT CUS TOMERS AS WELL AS THE LAW.

That the bootlegger is a cheat as well as a law-breaker is the verdict of the Michigan State Police officers who have been engaged in fighting scarlet fever. Mrs. Holcomb is the illicit liquor trade in this state. It is their opinion that the greed of the men who sell whisky is such that the latter will scruple at no fraud to make .

> While the average man is cautious enough in ordinary dealings, he seems to be as credulous as a child when it comes to buying forbidden liquor. of devices by which he buys something other than what he thinks he is paying for.

> Where whisky is sold in casks or jugs, two favorite tricks are used to swindle the buyer. One calls for the use of a funnel inserted in the container. The funnel contains real liquor while the remainder of the space is filled up with some other space is filled with parafin and then a small quantity of whisky is placed in the cavity left.

> Where whisky is sold in bottles there are many levices. Everyone has read of the soaking off of labels ferior spirits. Or a counterfeit label is used. Another trick calls for the emptying of the bottle by means of a hollow needle inserted alongside the cork and the re-filling with moonshine. The electric needle is also used for emptying bottles without removing the cork.

> In many craes the bootlegger does not substitute inferior whisky but merely adds water and thus makes three bottles of whisky out of one. But there is still another trick used which has a humorous tinge.
