Per haps the Allies should follow German precedent to the limit and occupy Berlin; maybe then Germany would find herself in more congenal mood toward acceptance of an Allied indemnity which is comparable with the German demands of 1871, although the guilt for war now rests upon the conquered rather than the conqueror nation.
