

Sec. 1. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as may be, and shall be continued open until five o'clock in the afternoon and no longer: Provided, That in townships the board of inspectors of election may, in its discretion, adjourn the polls at twelve o'clock noon, for one hour, and that the township board in townships, and the legis lative body in cities and villages may, by resolution adopted fifteen days prior to the election and pub-lished with the notice of the election, provide that the polls shall be opened at six o'clock in the fore-noon and may also provide that the polls shall be kept open not later than eight o'clock in the evening of

the same day.

The polls of said election will be open at 7 o'clock a. m. and will remain open until 5 o'clock p. m., of said day of election, unless the Board of Election Inspectors shall, in their discretion. in their discretion, adjourn the polls at 12 o'clock, noon, for one
