





A MAN BEFORE HIS TIME. On the evidence supplied by the yoynich manuscript Roger Bacon is ow credited with having used both the telescope and the microscope two centuries before Columbus discovered America. He anticipated some of the work of Galileo by more than 300 years and also the dis-coveries announced by Leeuwen-hoek and his pupils about 500 years after his death. In 1294 Bacon had seen and described objects in the heavens and in living things that should have revolutionized men's notions of astronomy and the bid logy but there was no revolution. Bacon did not dare tell the truth and such novel views as he ventured to express brought down upon him a popular suspicion that he was in league with the devil, and the uthorities locked him up. But it is not likely that the silen ing of Roger Bacon made much diff-erence with the progress of the world, for other truths as revolutionary as his had been announce efore his time and had sprung u only to wither and die like the see on barren ground. The idea tha he sun, not the earth, is the cente of the solar system was somethin, ike 2,000 years old when Coperni cus finally succeeded in making men believe it. It is beyond all question that America was discovered several times before Columbus reache these shores. Still, neither the heliocentric theory nor the discover of America affected the course of events until the world was read

If Bacon had told all he knew, an had gone to the stake for it the world would probably have waited for the Renamissance before accept ing his truth and would then have ttributed his discovery to someone else.-Detroit Free Press.
