Most of her life was spent in the neighborhood of Lowell with the exception of the last ten years in Grand Rapids. Eggs Waldorf Style.—Arrange poached eggs on circular pieces of toast and surround with brown mushroom sauce, placing a small broiled mushroom cap on each egg.

Brown Mushroom Sauce.—Melt three tablespoons of butter, add a few drops of onion juice and cook until slightly browned. Add three and one-half tablespoons of flour and continue browning.

Mushrooms on Toast.—Prepare the mushrooms as usual, suite in a small amount of butter, add cream, salt, paprika and serve poured over buttered toast.

Fruit Punch.—Upon a tablespoonful of good tea pour two quarts of boiling water. Have ready the juices and peelings of three lemons and one orange in a pitcher.

Milkshake.—Mix equal parts of condensed milk and cream. Add a pinch of salt and a dash of vanilla. Blend thoroughly and serve with plenty of ice.
