DICTATION ENDS.

Postmaster-General Will H. Hays signalizes the third month of his epochal administration of postal affairs by abolishing the press censorship which was assumed by his autocratic predecessor. Certain so-called "radical" publications were denied second class mail privileges by Mr. Burleson, but were admitted to the third class mails (which means transportation at a higher rate). Mr. Hays takes the view that such publications ar either entitled to full second class privileges or they are not entitled to the use of the mails at all. Further, he insists that "the arbitrar power" to decide whether a publi cation deserves the mails "was new er intended to be lodged in the Post master-General and it shall not be assumed." He adds: "Censorship of the press is not a function of the Postoflice Department and such censorship in the last three years

It is the busi ness of these Courts, acting under he statutes and the Constitution o determine the status of these radical journals.
