### CHAUTAUQUA

Five Big Days of Fun, Music, Drama and Philology, Aug. 18-22.

The famous Gilbert and Sullivan light opera, "The Mikado"; the rollicking comedy success, "Nothing But the Truth"; a concert of rare excellence by the Brahms Trio; Charles B. Taggart, tuneful humorist; brilliant lectures and exceptional musical entertainment companies—these are notable attractions which appear here on the 1921 Red-pink Chautauqua. Five big days are filled with fun, music, drama and philology.

The Weybelle Concert Company appearing on the first day is composed of remarkably versatile musicians and entertainers. Their concert in the afternoon and prelude at night will feature delightfully varied solo and ensemble numbers. Very Weybelle, accomplished Danish violinist and contralto soloist of the company, possesses a voice of exceptional richness, beauty and power.

On the first night, Ada Ward, brilliant, magnetic lecturer, will captivate her hearers with "You Americans." Miss Ward sees America with the eyes of a cultivated cosmopolitan and interprets what she sees with fire, wit and eloquent understanding. She is both a lecturer and entertainer of unique ability, and uses crayon and blackboard to emphasize her points. Sincere, inspiring, humorous, witty, she evokes tears and the next moment washes them away with the clearest of laughter. Here is the power of the spirit that immediately finds its way to the hearts of her hearers.

A grand concert on the second afternoon by the famous Brahms Trio will be one of the musical treats of the week. The violin, piano and cello, as played by the members of this trio, are a never failing source of delight to music lovers. Ensemble numbers from the classics and solos of wonderful charm and popular appeal are features of the program.

Each member of the Brahms Trio is a master musician. "Wiser Than Solomon" will be the lecture subject of Charles Zueblin, eminent publicist appearing on the second night.

Mr. Zueblin is a poet, a philosopher, a practical idealist, presenting a clear-cut, straight-from-the-shoulder message, tempered with humor and a most human philosophy. He speaks with electric energy, with rapid precision and with power. His lecture is refreshingly vigorous and stirring. The Zueblin lecture will be one of the big features of the Chautauqua.
