McPherson, member-elect of the state board of agricultural who appeared before the state board of equalization this afternoon for Kent county.

Mr. McPherson has no particular request to make for Kent county as against any other county, except Wayne. He did, however, declare that the recommended valuation of \$6,706,421,000 for the state was too high and should be reduced a bil-
