Starting probably from gasoline and blow torches being used during repairs to the room of the main building, the flames which were discovered about 11 o'clock this morning had

had refused to leave his cell in cell block and that he might have been burned to death as the cell block was soon a mass of names. Narrow escapes were numerous among those who were working outside to get the turnishings and the records out of the offices and the administration building. was the greatest factor in saving what of the prison remained intact onight, the boiler rooms of the hosalthough it was feared that he latter building might catch fire. On or two trusties made their escape shortly afternoon and a posse of men was scouring the flat along Grand River for them. Many of the other trusties were hard at work helping the reformatory officials and the guards to rescue prop-erty and prevent disorder. The usual chorus of shouts and cries from the crowds of men who spent their noon hour inside the walls could be plainly heard outside. That the state officials had been

warned to provide better fire pro-tection for the institution and that they had felt that as long as it had been here for many years without being burned, it could last a while longer, was declared by one reformatory officers today. The fire pro-tection there proved entirely inadequate even to halt the blaze and the puny streams of water made no mpression upon it. It simply had

to burn itself out. Dinner had been carefully pre-pared for the reformatory officials and the board of control which was to meet here today to hold its regular session. Dishes of well arranged salad, of lettuce leaves, with tempting looking white stalks of asparagus and tomato slices, were rescued and placed in the front yard where clouds of black smoke blew over them and hissing cinders dropped into the mayonnaise. Highly polished furniture, pile after pile of books and records were moved time and again farther back from the blazing wreck that soon settled down to belching furnace. So far as could be ascertained nothing of value was lost in the offices.

The last fire of importance which occured at the reformatory was on February 13, 1913 when the factory buildings of the Ypsilanti Reed fur-niture burned with great loss. At that time the need for adequate fire protection for state building was demonstrated but nothing has been done since then to improve the fa-cilities of the Ionia institution. Ionia city did all that it could do but the fire was too hot to handle. water works gave all that the four inch main would carry and the truck pumped all that was furnished. Even the old hand hosecarts and hose wagon were hauled out but there was not enough water to sup-ply the lines of hose that were run. Temporary telephones were placed in the prison yard near the front entrance and kept on duty there until it was necessary to remove them to a further distance






