BAND & GRAVEL CO. EXPECTS TO OPERATE NEXT SEASON. Becently a number of the stock-bolders of the Lowell Sand & Gravel Company from Lowell and Alto made a trip to their property near trying or about seven miles from Hastings, to inspect the work that has been done.

The company owns 331 acres of land of which about 250 is good farming land and the balance gravel. Under direction of Frank Howk, the general manager of the company, considerable work has already been done and the work will now be rapidly pushed to completion. It is expected that everything will be ready to start operations early in the coming spring. The plant will have a capacity of twenty-live car loads of sand and gravel per ten hour day. The demand for the product is very keen and some idea of the business may be gained by the fact that the railroads have had a revenue from the pits near Grand Rapids of over \$300,000,000, so far this year.





General Commends Books But Treasurer's County Books But Treasurer's.

The books and accounts of every county office except that of treasurer were found to be in excellent condition by state accountants, Mark E. Hathaway and George W. Moulton, recently at work here, according to the report transmitted by Auditor General O. B. Fuller yesterday to County Clerk Robert G. Hill, County Treasurer Jesse W. Clark and Christian Gallmeyer, chairman of the finance committee.

The auditor general is disappointed that the balances found in the treasurer's office in May, 1920, when the new accounting system was in-

the new accounting system was installed, were not recognized by the treasurer. He also complains "the audit does not show a reconciliation of all the bank accounts nor the actual condition of each of the assessment district covert road funds, which by reason of the press of engagements the examiners were unable to devote the time that would be required to adjust these

The totals are found correct, however, and the compliment is added that "we do not think the record in this department is equalled by any road commission in the state."

Balances Not Recognized.

Relative to the county treasurer's office," the accountants say, "we wish to state that in May, 1920, we devoted considerable time in Kent county in establishing their redemption accounts. These balances were not recognized by the county treasurer. The Covert road construction money has been placed in one fund, the redemption in another, and all bills paid from these accounts without regard to accounting for the balances in the several districts. In this manner the treasurer would know nothing in regard to the balance in any particular assessment district and it would be possible for the road commission to expend all of the money in one assessment district, or all of the redemption money in payment of bonds and interest in one or two districts. It should be borne in mind that the fund of an assessment district road cannot be used for any other road, or in any other assessment district.

"We find the delinquent tax is not accounted for in the proper manner, the uniform accounting system not being followed out in full.

Regarding Daily Balances.

"We find that no reconciliation has been made since February 1921, although the accounts with the bank or banks should be reconciled each month,

"We find the daily balances in the

"We find the daily balances in the treasurer's office are not kept up as maintained by the accounting system. These balances should be correctly kept and it would not require very much time each day to complete the record.

"We do not believe that County Treasurer Clark had a thorough understanding of these accounts but know that when they are straightened out be will have no difficulty in the future.— Grand Rapids Herald.
