These were the engimas which yesterday puzzled the board of supervisors at its first meeting of the January session. And when the board had finished the session the problem had not been solved.

It came up almost immediately after the supervisors convened, when the request of the western Michigan development bureau for an appropriation of \$1,000 was presented. The request was turned down 23 to 23., the lineup being, in a general way, the city against county. Two city members were absent. This appropriation was defeated at the October session also.

When the appropriation was proposed, some one asked whether the board of supervisors had a right to make such an appropriation under the ruling given by Prosecutor Cornelius Hoffius last week which was construed to be the effect that the county board of auditors is the supreme authority of the county.

Hoffius called before the board, was asked whether the board could make appropriations after the budget had been fixed for the coming year. He replied by asking where the board obtained the idea he had ruled the auditors had a right to o. k. a bill whether there were any funds or not and that such action would constitute a legal claim against the county.
