



LOWELL'S VERACITY LOUDLY QUESTIONED. Whitehall, January 14.—When Lowell made the announcement in The Press on January 12 that it held the record for grocery stores it probably felt that it had a clear title to the record, but Lowell or any other town will have to "step some" to beat Whitehall. Whitehall, with a population of 1,200, has nine grocery stores, an average of one store for every 144 inhabitants. Until a year ago 10 exclusive groceries were displaying their shingles. So Whitehall leads with one store to every 144 inhabitants against Lowell with one to 257. Lakeview, January 14.—This town would beg to inform the Lowellites that they are just a little behind one other small town. This town has a population of 1,000 and there are seven grocery stores here and every one of them thriving.—Grand Rapids Press.

LOWELL SNOWED UNDER. Shelby, January 16.—Shelby has Lowell, Whitehall and Lakeview surpassed, when it comes to grocery stores per capita of population. This town has 10 grocery stores and a population of 1,250. Hersey, January 16.—Lowell, Whitehall and Lakeview must bow the largest number of grocery stores per 100 population, but this little village of only 300 has four groceries, one for each 75 persons.—Grand Rapids Press.

LOWELL STARTS IT; PULLMAN TO END IT. Pullman, January 18.—Noting the claims of Shelby, Lowell, Hersey and other villages regarding the number of grocery stores per capita in Michigan. Here is the data. At the last census Mesick was credited with 381 residents. This number has been increased to 500 since. To serve this number there are six grocery stores and each one of them doing a thriving business. That means that there is one grocery store to every 67 inhabitants.—Grand Rapids Press.

FARMER CHARGES LAW ENFORCED BY CLOSING OF CANNON TOWNSHIP ROAD. The alleged closing of a public road in Cannon township without due process of law was denounced yesterday in the filing of a petition by Fred Stroud and Barbara Stroud, of Cannon township asking circuit for a mandamus to compel E. P. Hudson, highway commissioner of the township, to reopen a road closed last April. The piece of road is in Section 21, northwest of Cannonburg. When it was barricaded, it was understood the purpose was to repair a bridge over a creek. When the petitioners learned otherwise they consulted the files of the town clerk and learned the road had been closed permanently on petition of 17 residents of the section. A show is alleged in the proceedings, the law providing that notice of a proposed closing must be served on all property owners and a hearing held. According to Hudson's affidavit in the town clerk's files, he served a notice on only one man, and that person was one of the signers of the petition to have the road closed.—Grand Rapids Herald.

BRKAS STORM WINDOW, DUB-GLAS GETS LOOT. Ionia, Jan. 17.—A hold burglary occurred at 5 o'clock Thursday morning when some one burst a dry cell battery through the storm window of the Ionia Hardware Co. and made away with two automatic revolvers, a rifle, two cameras and other booty.
