

Form. Our friend Harry C. White, of Grand Rapids, has kindly compiled with The Ledger's request for a statement of his position on the commission form of government as applied to the county. He states: Thave never taken a position fav-orable to the commission plan for counties, although I recognize the cumbersome methods of legislation resulting from a board of forty-eight members. I have felt for some time and do still feel that if a scheme of government could be devised which would retain the features of representation embraced in the present organization which would at the same time reduce the number of supervisors that it would permit of more rapid transaction of the county's legislative work. This could of course, only be accom-plished by increasing the size of the townships. If instead of twenty-four, there were twelve townships, this would permit of a correspond-ing reduction of the city representa-tion to twelve and would thus re-sult in cutting the membership of the board in half. Legislatively, I believe that this would result in bet-ter work, but I realize that it might not be at all feasible to increase the size of the townships.
