IS HELD FOR TRIAL

Motor Garment Head Valves Examination and in Fraud on \$2,000 Bail.

Stanton, May 8.—Waiving examination, Roy M. Beardlee, 38, former secretary-treasurer and general manager of the defunct Michigan Motor Garment company, this afternoon was bound over to circuit court for trial Sept. 13, on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. His bail was fixed at \$3,000, which he furnished.

Beardlee was arrested in Milwaukee and brought here this morning by Sheriff Fred A. Curtis. The warrant was made out on complaint of several Stanton residents, who charge Beardlee with procuring \$12,000 from them through a stock deal. They allege he sold them stock in the motor garment concern with the understanding that he was to establish a branch factory in Stanton. The plant was established, but five weeks later the company went into receivership. They also allege that the financial statement submitted by Beardlee when the stock was purchased, was false and that the company was really insolvent at that time.

Failed a Year Ago. The arrest of Beardlee is the outcome of the failure of the Garment company, nearly a year ago. This company had six branch factories located in Lowell, Howard City, Cedar Springs, Carson City, Edmore and Stanton. About forty women were employed in each of the branches in addition to about 125 in the main factory at Greenville.

Residents of Stanton purchased nearly \$11,000 worth of preferred stock in the company in April, 1921. It was while Beardlee was quarantined with scarlet fever that other officials of the garment company found that the financial statements which Beardlee had furnished to his board of directors were inflated and that instead of being a flourishing corporation it was seriously involved in the financial difficulties.

G. R. Trust Company Receiver. The Grand Rapids Trust company was named receiver for the company July 19, 1921. It was alleged that the concern was forced to the wall through mismanagement of Beardlee.

Beardlee immediately left Greenville and has been living in Milwaukee for the past year. He is married, his wife being prominent in musical circles in Greenville, and who has made her home with her mother, Mrs. Ada Black, for the last year.—*[Grand Rapids Herald.]*

NURSES NEEDED BY GOVERNMENT. Washington, D. C., April 1922. The United States Civil Service Commission states that there is need for nurses in the hospital of the United States Veterans' Bureau and the Public Health Service units at Indian schools and agencies. Applications will be received for these positions until further notice.

Applicants are not given a written examination, but are rated upon the basis of their physical ability, weighted at 80 per cent. Applicants must have graduated from a recognized school for trained nurses requiring a residence of at least two years in a hospital giving thorough practical and theoretical training.

Full information concerning entrance requirements, salaries, etc., and application blanks, may be obtained by communicating with the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or the secretary of the civil service board at the post office or custom house in any city.

GRAND RAPIDS TO GET NEW \$750,000 HOSPITAL. Grand Rapids, Mich., May 7.—Erection of a new Butterworth hospital of 250 beds, involving an expenditure of \$750,000 and expanding into a 400-bed institution with an investment of \$1,000,000, will begin as soon as plans are completed in detail by the architects. The exterior plan is not yet finished by the architects but the floor plans have progressed so far that members of the building committee have been given a definite idea of what the building will be like. For the present, these plans provide for a three-unit building, making it possible to operate various departments of the hospital practically as separate institutions. It will be sound proof and constructed of fire proof brick.

HERE ARE FISH LAWS

Better Clip This One and "Mind Your Step."

Open season started Monday on brook trout of all varieties and on wall-eyed pike. The legal limit for trout during the season, which lasts until September 1, is seven inches in length, excepting only those trout caught in the north branch of the Au Sable, where the limit is eight inches. Only 20 can be caught in a day, and that number is the limit in possession at a stream. Forty can be legally possessed away from a stream. Trout must be carried as hand baggage, it being unlawful to ship them in any way.

The season for wall-eyed pike extends until February 1. The legal size is 10 inches in length. Only 10 can be taken in a day or in possession at one time in inland waters of Michigan, no regulation in this regard being imposed on the Great Lakes or connecting waters.

Other laws relative to open season on the different varieties of fish and the rules governing their capture in Michigan waters are cited by the department of conservation, as follows:

"It is unlawful to buy or sell, or attempt to buy or sell, any brook trout, large or small mouth black bass, catfish, white bass, sturgeon, blue gills, sunfish, rock bass, wall-eyed pike and crappie. Perch over nine inches in length may be commercialized.

"Open season on large and small mouth black bass, June 10 to March 31, inclusive. Limit, 10 in one day—10 at one time.

"Grayling—Unlawful to take at any time.

"Open season on blue gills, June 10 to March 31, inclusive. Legal length six inches. Limit, 25 in one day—25 at one time.

"Open season on white bass, and crappies, June 10 to March 31, inclusive. Legal length, seven inches. Limit, 25 in one day—25 at one time."
