WEST FRIDAY

Turbulent Crowd Gathers at City Hall When Arrests Were Made.

Two revolver shots, piercing screams in a woman's voice, mingled with the shouts and jeers of a turbulent crowd of men, youths and boys, accompaniments of two arrests made by Village Marshal Pat Boves last Friday night, with one or more men calling, "Bring a rope!" featured an affair that savored more of the wild West of other days than of the quiet and orderly town that Lowell ought to be and that our citizens have determined it shall be.

Roscoe Pattenall, of Ionia, was arrested by the Marshal and lodged in jail on a drunk and disorderly charge. Then came John Stair, of Saranac, who had been about town with Pattenall, and by his threatening actions and words caused the officer to arrest him also. This was accomplished after a struggle in which the officer fired two revolver shots at the ground to stop Stair's escape, the latter's discovery under a rear building and a final scuffle, in which the Marshal used his "billy."

His men locked up and his attention diverted to the crowd around the jail, much of which was very evidently opposed to the arrests, the prisoners escaped through the back door and got away.

Pattenall was re-captured next day and Tuesday pleaded guilty to the charge against him and was fined by Justice A. M. Andrews \$50 and \$33.33 costs, the large amount of the latter being due to the time spent in his recapture and—owing to local conditions—to the necessity for a constant guard at the jail.

Officer Boves drove to Lansing in his efforts to get his man but up to Wednesday morning at 2 o'clock the latter was still at liberty.

At that early hour Stair returned voluntarily and surrendered himself to Night Watch Wright, who locked him up.

Wednesday afternoon Stair was arraigned before Justice Andrews, pled guilty to the charge and was fined \$75 and \$34.70 costs or ninety days in jail. He chose the former. Reasons for large costs were same in Pattenall case, only "more so."

After the settlement of the Pattenall case a piece of iron pipe containing a screw-driver was found in the jail, where it had evidently been dropped through the iron grating from the outside wall to assist the prisoners to escape.

Relative to the disposition on the part of some to make the discharge of his duties difficult and disagreeable so as to cause him to resign or be discharged, Mr. Boves declares his intention to stick and "put her through."

Village President Archart, backed by the council, announces his intention of fighting it out along this line and says that if two officers are not enough, more will be appointed. What is needed is thorough co-operation between all our officers—nothing less can be tolerated—and the loyal support of the citizens of Lowell. The latter, we are sure, will not be lacking. Law and order must be preserved in Lowell.

THE SCHOOL GARDEN.

The Lowell High school agricultural garden this year, is what we choose to call a curiosity plot. It is planted on a plot of ground kindly loaned by the King Milling company and is situated just south of the Central school building.

In it are planted numerous field crops including the following: several varieties of corn, sorghum, broom corn, kafir corn, sudan grass, millet, Hubam clover (annual sweet clover), soy beans, cow peas, and potatoes and a few garden vegetables. Its purpose is two fold: First to provide material for class and laboratory work in the Agricultural classes next year. Secondly to give the students and the farmers a chance to observe some of the less commonly grown crops under local conditions. This particular soil is not especially adapted to all of these different crops but will show their habits of growth and some idea of what may be expected under more favorable soil conditions.

ROD AND GUN CLUB

Lowell Sportsmen Organize, Lease Grounds, Build Club House.

A sportsman club has been organized by a number of sportsmen of Lowell and vicinity. This club is called the Lowell Rod and Gun club, and purposes to work for the proper protection of game and fish, to foster good fellowship among sportsmen, and to promote the art of trapshooting. The membership is to be limited in number and made up of clean sportsmen, who agree to live up to the sportsman creed and who care for club life.

The club has leased the pretty little tract of ground at the south end of the big pond of the Consumer's Power Co., having for its east boundary, the canal going to the power plant. These grounds are going to be enclosed and cleared up, and a temporary club house built, while plans for a regular club house are being marked out.

There is an open area where the trapshooting is done, a ball diamond, an archery and a rifle range is being arranged for, also barn yard golf, or quot pitching, will be included.

It has been proven that sportsmen must organize in order to save our fish and game, for several reasons. The number of hunters and fishermen are increasing every year, and of course the number of fish and game birds also increase in number. If our fish and game are properly protected we will continue to have good fishing and hunting.

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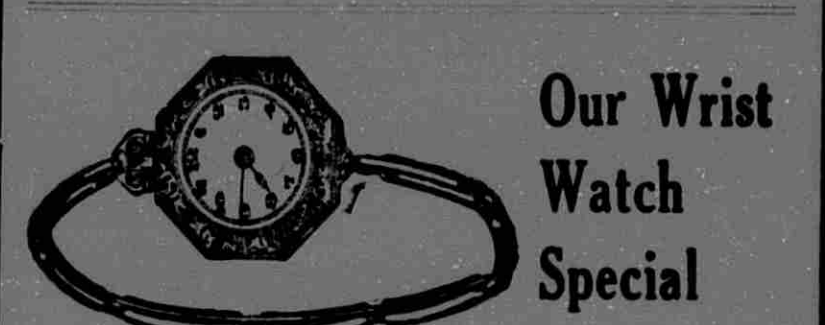

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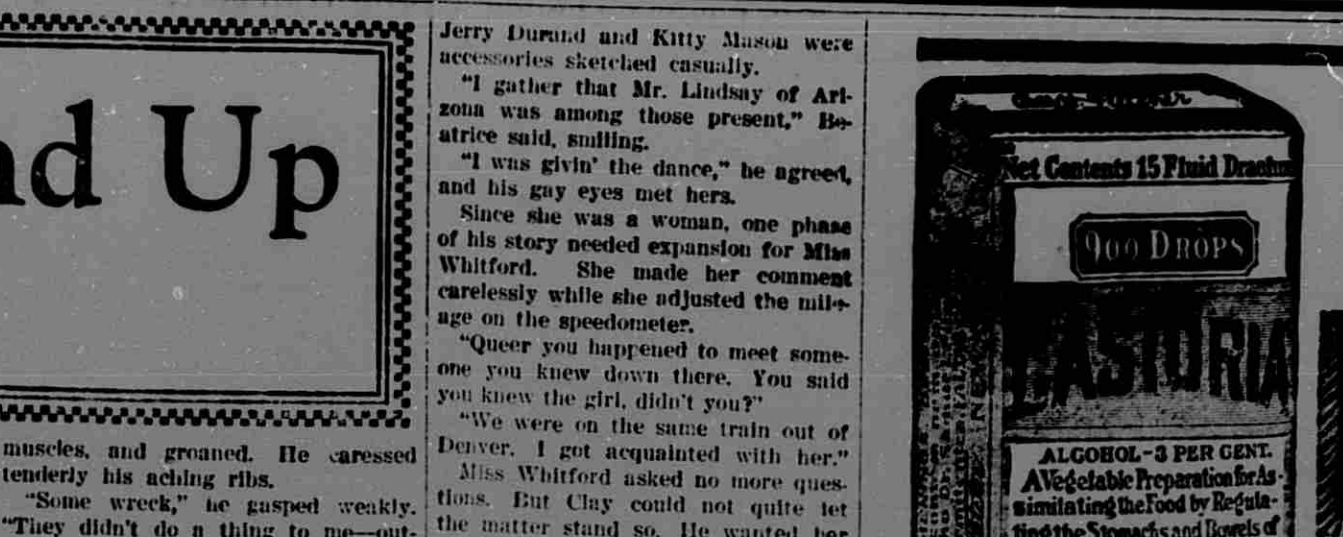
