He would retain the board of supervisors as now but he would have this board choose three persons either from their own body or from outside—he is open to argument on this point—who shall constitute an executive commission. He would have these three men hold office for three years, one retiring each year and subject to recall upon vote of two thirds the members of the board of supervisors.

This commission would have general charge in an executive capacity of all county government. It would have the power to summon county officials before it and to remove for cause any such official but the right of appointment to fill a vacancy would be left with the supervisors.

Mr. Jakeway would abolish the board of auditors and have the executive commission appoint one auditor who must be a certified public accountant and work on his job all the time. He points out that now the county must call in an accountant every so often to make a general audit.

Reorganise Read Body.

Mr. Jakeway would reorganise the county road commission by naming one member an executive chairman to be in the office all the time and with a sufficient salary so be could afford to work at his job. He would provide that no bid for construction should be accepted if it was more than 10 per cent above the engineer's estimate.
