ADMISSION
Children entering the kindergarten should be five years old.
Pupils from other schools will be accepted on the basis of the classification presented but for trial only. The final classification will be made at the end of the trial period.
Holders of county eighth grade diplomas will be admitted to the ninth grade with out examination. Full credit will be given for work completed in high schools of equal rank but in all cases when credits are accepted the student is admitted on trial.
HIGH SCHOOL
The Lowell High School is on the accredited list of the University of Michigan. This affiliation enables graduates to enter the leading colleges without examination.
RECORDS
Record is made of each student's work from day to day, and regular reports are made to the parent or guardian each five weeks. A careful examination of these reports is requested for they tell whether or not the student is doing satisfactory work.
Students are graded as follows: A, 95-100, excellent; B+, 90-95, very good; B, 85-90, good; B-, 80-85, fair; C, 75-80, passing; C-, 70-75, conditioned; D is below 70 and re-classify; I is incomplete. All final standings are recorded as above and remain a permanent testimonial of the student's scholarship.
GRADUATION
Sixteen units of credit are required for graduation. Students expecting to be recommended to higher institutions must have fifteen credits acceptable to that institution.
