Ionia, Oct. 11--Ionia county has in the past year expended \$50,000. 14 in the construction of new County road roads and \$11,807.29 was the cost of maintenance of trunk line roads in the county. There are now 90.22 miles of trunk line roads, of which 65 miles are being maintained. The superintendent of road maintenance this year has driven between 22,000 and 25,000 miles in overseeing the work.
