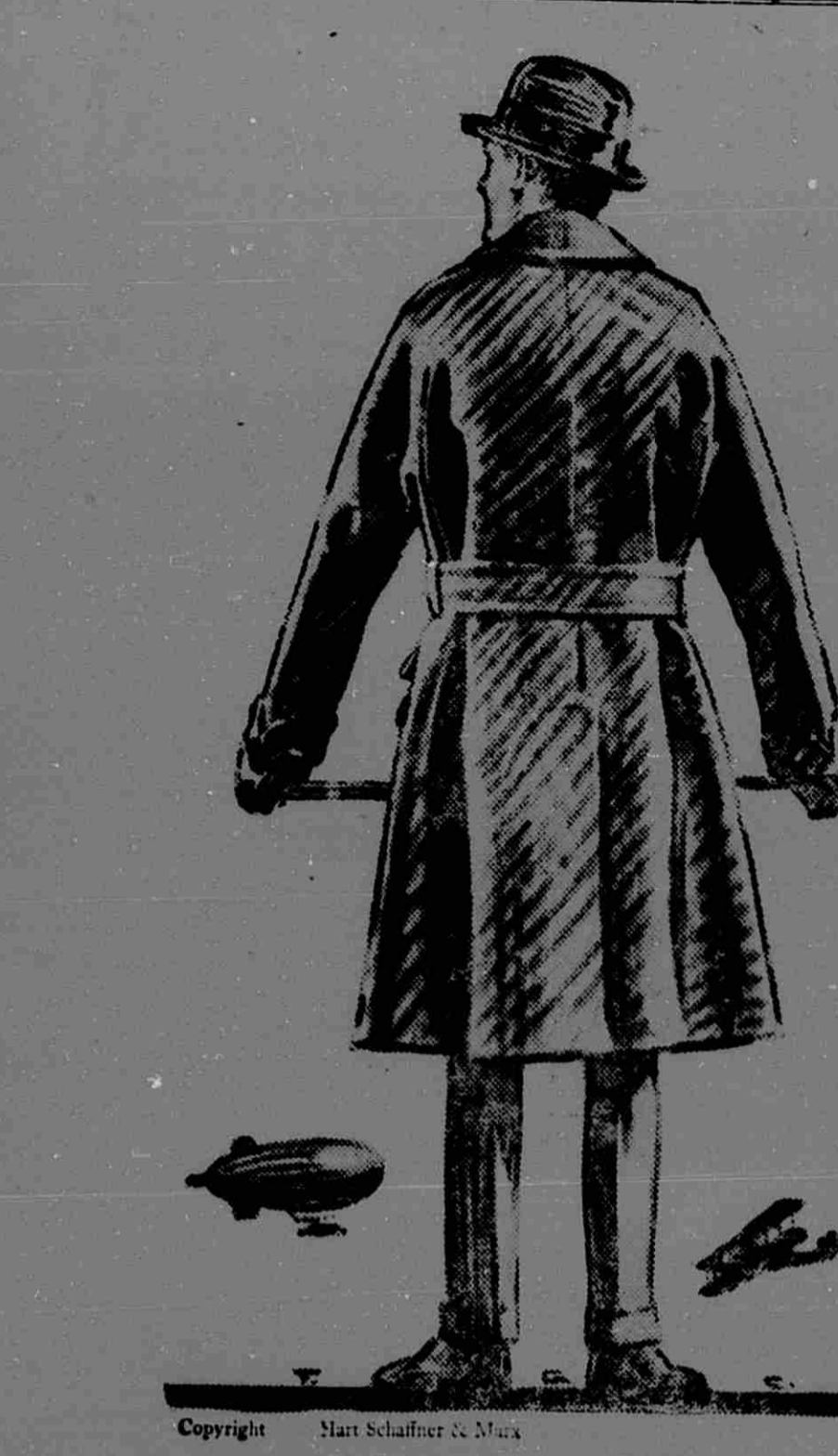

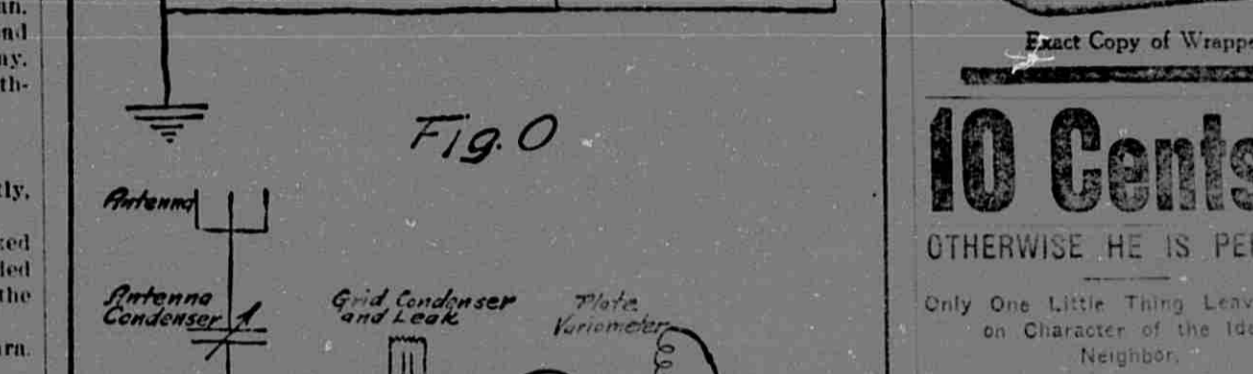

## SALARY BOOSTERS

Prosecutor's Indefinite Contract Remains as It Is; State Fair Gets \$1,000

"On the other side of the aisle," as the county members class themselves at the present session of the board of supervisors, the increases in present salaries was met with general disfavor. Every vote taken on salary advancement drew several "nay" votes from the county members.

Jess W. Clark, treasurer, is to receive \$4,000, an advance of \$500 over his present salary.

An argument was raised regarding the abstract department in the register of deed's office, William Thomas from Cannon township expressed his opinion that the abstracts should not be issued merely for convenience by the register's office, since private corporations can offer the same service at no expense to the county. J. Jay Wood of the Third ward said that the charges of private abstract offices are one-third more than the county charges, and that the people are not willing to pay the extra charges.

Walter Clinton, clerk of juvenile court, and Helen Brown, research clerk of the court, were each allowed an increase in salary of \$150. Corvelius Bennett, an attaché of the juvenile home and the juvenile court, who has recently moved to the home, where he receives his board and room, was cut \$150 a year. The motion made by a county member to leave the juvenile court changes on the table for a day for investigation was lost.

**Earley Gets Big Increase**

Circuit Court Commissioner Edward L. Earley, who has previously to this time received only \$1,500 as set by a statute passed 30 years ago, was allowed an increase of \$1,000.

Adelaide Haight, mother's pension investigator, who in the past has received only \$1,400 for her work, which includes the distribution of a \$75,000 budget, was granted an increase of \$200.

Walter Clinton, clerk of juvenile court, and Helen Brown, research clerk of the court, were each allowed an increase in salary of \$150. Corvelius Bennett, an attaché of the juvenile home and the juvenile court, who has recently moved to the home, where he receives his board and room, was cut \$150 a year. The motion made by a county member to leave the juvenile court changes on the table for a day for investigation was lost.

**Prosecutor's Contract Unchanged**

The prosecuting attorney's salary of \$12,000 a year, from which he has to pay his assistants and secretary, was left unchanged after a long discussion. Arthur F. Shaw from the Third ward suggested that the salary of the prosecutor be made definite and that the assistants be paid a stipulated sum by the county. Frank J. Walsh, Nelson in furthering this statement, said that he, out of curiosity, would like to know how much the prosecutor paid his assistants and help so they could compare his salary with other officials. Prosecuting Attorney Cornelius Loftus was consulted on the subject, and said that the arrangements made by the board were immaterial to him, except that if they decided to pay his assistants separately he would like to be consulted regarding the amounts. The motion made by Mr. Shaw to refer the report back to the committee on salaries for reconsideration was defeated, and the present system of payment was passed by a large affirmative vote.

O'Donnell Disappointed

The committee on salaries suggested that Ed. O'Donnell's salary as under-sheriff remain at \$2,000 and that his application for \$500 additional be refused. William Oltman sponsored the raise, expressing his views that the responsibility of the position warranted the increase. The original report however was accepted.

Justice Harry L. Creswell's application for a \$150 increase in his county's share of his salary was approved to take effect after his present term of office expires.

Pauline Register's salary as matron of the juvenile home was increased from \$1,500 to \$1,800 on recommendation of the committee.

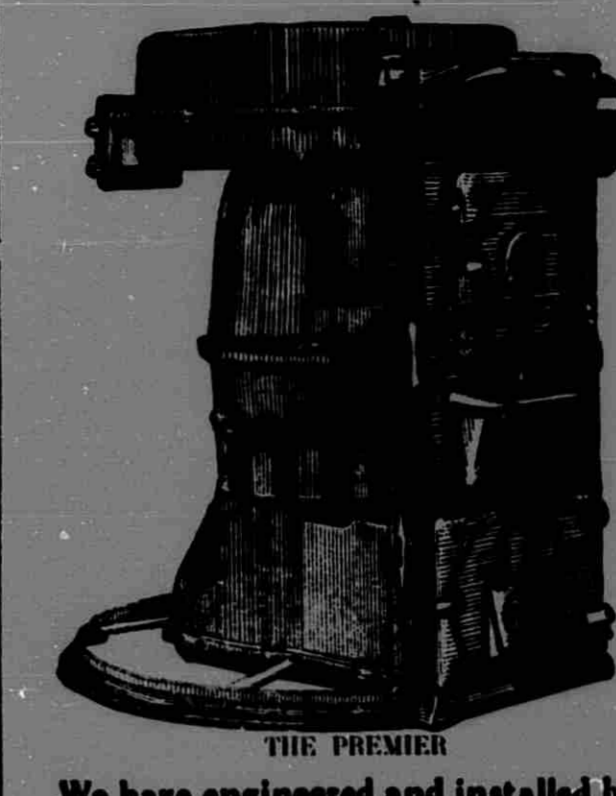
