Clarissa Alma Tallant was born March 17, 1847, in South Boston, Ionia county, Mich., and passed away at her home in Lowell, Wednesday, December 27, 1922.

She was the youngest child of Euphrasia and James Monroe Tallant, who came to Michigan from Massachusetts in 1834, with a party of relatives and took up government land in 1836 in Ionia county, naming the locality South Boston, after their old home, Boston, Mass, Her grandparents, William and Jane White, later came from the East to live with their children, Mrs. Jane White having the distinction
