LIQUOR SQUAD RAID BAD BUS ACCIDENT

Harry Peckham, Bill and Whisky Taken by Sheriff's Men.

Much rejoicing was felt and expressed in Lowell Saturday afternoon over reports current that a successful liquor raid had been made in this vicinity and that another was in prospect.

It was a case of a long-suffering public and of hope long deferred now, perhaps, about to be realized. And now, so far as is possible, let long-suffered justice be done.

The following report appeared in the Sunday morning Grand Rapids Herald:

County liquor deputies aided by Special Officer John Sponstra, head of the police liquor squad, in raids conducted in the county early yesterday afternoon placed a man and a woman under arrest on a charge of violating the prohibition laws when they uncovered two alleged liquor distilleries and confiscated a large quantity of moonshine whiskey.

At a farmhouse on the outskirts of Lowell the raiders arrested Harry Peckham, 30, and Bernadine Wolfe, 24, who gave her former address as 429 Colt Ave., NE, Grand Rapids. They found a 10-gallon still in operation, 10 gallons of moonshine whiskey and four barrels or 200 gallons of whiskey mash in their possession. Both admitted ownership to the confiscated articles.

In a trunk in an upstairs bedroom of the farmhouse alleged to be that of Peckham's wife Ann, who was away at the time of the raid, officers found several quarts of whiskey. A warrant charging possession of liquor will be issued for her arrest, officials said last night.

Held "Run Running" Auto.
An automobile believed by the raiders to have been used by Peckham for run running is being held by Sheriff William L. Smith until further evidence can be secured regarding its disposal. Peckham and the woman will be arraigned on charges of manufacturing and possessing liquor.

At the farm owned by William McGrath in Ionia county a few miles from Lowell the raiders destroyed a 10-gallon still, 12 gallons of moonshine whiskey and 100 gallons of whiskey mash.

Because of a search warrant issued for Kent county the officers were unable to arrest McGrath. Evidence obtained for the search warrant was effected by county deputies, but after the raiders surveyed the location of the farmhouse it was found to be inside of Ionia county by several hundred feet.

Kent county deputies held McGrath under arrest until the arrival of Sheriff County of Ionia with a warrant. McGrath was taken into custody by the Ionia sheriff and charged with manufacturing and possessing liquor.

Tuesday, Deputy Bowes arrested Mrs. Peckham at her home and took her to the county jail also.

LOWELL GIRL HURT IN COASTING ACCIDENT
Miss Elsie Velzy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Velzy, of Lowell, is in Blodgett hospital with a broken leg, as the result of a coasting accident. Following is the story as told by Monday morning's Herald:
Sled Tips; Girl Hurt.
A girl coaster was taken to Blodgett hospital and several others were removed to their homes following the tipping of a bob sled on which about 14 youths and girls were riding down Umatilla st., hill between Union and Madison aves., last night. Elsie Velzy, 20, whose home is in Lowell, was caught between the sled and the ground when it capsized and her right leg was broken below the knee. She was taken to the hospital by police. Gordon O'Donnell, 14, of 1622 Division ave., S., was cut about the face and hand, Winifred Hawkins, 12, of 1324 Prospect ave., SE, was injured about one leg, and several others were less seriously hurt.

The sled, according to the injured, swerved twice, narrowly missing a tree, swung into another one, and capsized, hurling the coasters in all directions. The hill is one set aside for coasting and is protected from other traffic.

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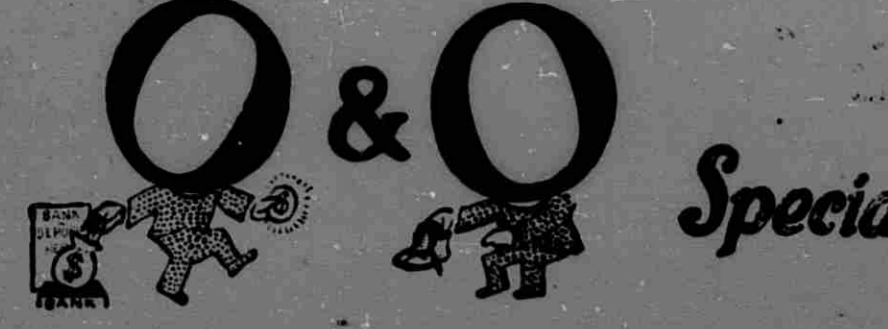
