College Requirements for High School Students

For the benefit of parents, as well as students, we present following. It is found that many parents and pupils do not understand the University of Michigan entrance requirements. The following statements cover the main ponnts.

Only those applicants are admitted on certificates who are officially recommended graduates of high schools accredited to this university, and have completed a full four-year curriculum in a standard high school, covering at least lifteen units, will recommend not all graduates, but only those whose character, ability, application and scholarship are so clearly superior that the school is willing to stand sponsor for their success at the University. The grade requirement for recommendation about the distinctly high.

for their success at the University. The grade requirement for recommendation should be distinctly higher than that for graduation.

The lifteen or more units required for admission on certificate must include twelve or more units from Group 1, and must contain as a minimum five units regularly scheduled for the third and fourth years of the high school curriculum. The inclusion of six or more such units is urgently recommended. Those who enter with less than five advanced units will be required to pursue throughout their freshman year a third continuation or major high school subject.


