GONE TO REST.

Daniel S. Blanding, a resident of Vergennes township for many years, and one of the oldest and most respected citizens of Kent county, passed away at his home in Vergennes Friday, March 9, at the splendid old age of 93 years, 4 months, and 5 days.

Funeral services were held at the home Sunday afternoon under the auspices of Lowell Lodge No. 90 F. & A. M., Rev. H. H. Harris, officiating clergyman; burial with the beautiful Masonic service in the Krum cemetery, near which he had lived during the greater part of his life.

Mr. Blanding was born in Cayuga County, New York, Nov. 5, 1829; and was in the famous "Pike's Peak or bust" drive from that state in the early fifties, and after his return from the West settled in Vergennes, which has since been his home.

He was initiated in the Masonic order in 1864 but for some reason did not complete the work of Master Mason until June, 1891, since which time he was an interested attendant of Lowell Lodge until his health failed several years ago. On his 90th birthday anniversary he was visited at his home by a large delegation of Lowell Masons, among whom was Simon Petiti of like age and the only surviving charter member.

Mr. Blanding lived a long, useful, and peaceful life and in Vergennes and Lowell, where he was a familiar and well-met figure, he will ever be held in respected memory.
