The memorial erected in 1915 to Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, founder of the Christian Science Church, designed by Epton Searnment of New York, consists of a circular open colonnade of eight columns resting on a base of three steps and surrounded on the front by a circular platform, from which leads a double flight of stairs to the edge of a small lake. It is constructed of white granite with floral details and inscriptions in bronze. A fund of \$130,000 was raised for its erection and maintenance.

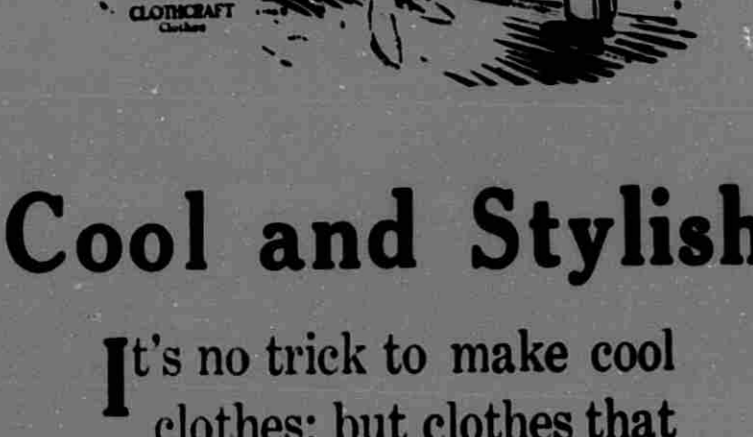
