a fashion all over the world. For America is a world power nowadays and its sons and daughters are many in most parts of the earth. And wherever they are, they will gather in honor of the Star-Spangled Banner. For example, 500 Chienguans visiting Gothenburg's tercentennial will give Sweden an object lesson in Fourth of July colebrations. Wherever Old Glory floats, there will be some sort of observance of the day the homeland celebrates. Moreover, all the peoples of earth, with few exceptions, will be in sympathy with these celebrations, for it is coming more and more to be understood that American independence and liberty stand for a world-wide idea.
