COUNTY'S SHARK OF AUTO LI-CENSE CERS \$239,946 Kent county receives \$239,946.59 as its share of the automobile license fees collected during the first six months of this year, according to information received vesterday by H. J. McKinley, clerk of the county road commission, from Auditor General O. G. Fuller. The amount for the same period last year was \$188,632.17.

The county received \$159,920.37 from the license fees during the first quarter of 1923, as compared to \$138,680.57 last year, and payment will soon be made of \$80,026.22 for the second quarter of this year. This compares with \$40,251.60 for the same period last year.—Herald.
