Next Week Comes The Chautauqua

BIG CANVAS SPREAD HERE TUESDAY TO BE SCENE OF GREAT ATTRACTIONS

Oscar W. Smith, the seven-day advance man of the Redpath Chautauqua, is here to help the local Chautauqua committee with the advertising and sale of season tickets for the Chautauqua at Lowell this year.

Mr. Smith assures the local committee that they have with out a doubt the best program ever offered to the people of Lowell and vicinity. The program this year embraces such headliners as on the first day the Metropolitan Orchestra and John B. Ratto, the impersonator. The Metropolitan Orchestra is composed of five talented and charming young ladies who are masters of their instruments and give a program on the first afternoon that wins immediate recognition and praise from their hearers. The Metropolitan Orchestra give a short prelude at night followed by John B. Ratto, the impersonator, a man who has spent eighteen years in this line of work and has given over 4000 shows. Mr. Ratto's program consists of three parts, the first giving impersonations of every day people, the second impersonations of the great music composers such as the composers of Carmen, William Tell and others. The orchestra assists Mr. Ratto in this part of his program by playing selections from the operas that made these men famous. The third part consists of impersonations of men famous in public life and in the world war, such as Lloyd George, General Pershing and others.

The rest of the week's program equals or exceeds the first day, according to the individual taste of the audience. The second afternoon, the Glenn Wells Co. will entertain with music and a three-act drama "Atone-ment," written especially for them by the well known English playwright, Herbert Thomas. Some time ago Mr. Thomas requested the Glenn Wells Co. to give him permission to run this play in London. Permission being given "Atone-ment" is now being rehearsed for a London run. The Glenn Wells Co. will give a short prelude on the second night followed by a lecture by Judge Geo. D. Alden from the supreme bench of Massachusetts. Judge Alden two years ago covered the New Zealand and Australian circuit and every town he spoke in has requested that he be returned. The third afternoon feature will be a lecture, "The Basis of Liberty," by Frank Preston Johnson. Mr. Johnson has made a study of the relation of the farmer to the business country to the business community and his lecture in a good measure is relative to this. Every farmer and business man should hear this lecture as it has been highly praised by the press everywhere. The third night is play night. "Cappy Hicks" will be the play this year and a good many no doubt have read quite a few of the "Cappy Hicks" stories that ran in the Saturday Evening Post. This play has had a successful New York, Chicago and Detroit run and is played by a New York cast. The Redpath Chautauqua operate a calling and directing office in New York where all the plays for Chautauquas are sent out from. The fifth afternoon, Bhasker Hivale, a prominent Hindu, will give a highly instructive address on the New India. Mr. Hivale is a graduate of one of the leading universities of India and a post-graduate of Harvard. His address is a revelation to many people as he brings a vivid description of how the people in his country live, their habits, the problems and many other things of interest. On the fifth or last night, the Montague Light Opera Singers will give the entire program featuring the light opera "Gretchen of Holland," which has proven a big success everywhere. The Montague Light Opera Singers are a premier musical organization that have received the highest praise from the musical critics of the country.

"Deal Gently With Women"--Judge

TWO FINED FOR VIOLATION OF BLUE SKY LAW AS ALTO MATRON COMPLAINS

"Notwithstanding the fact that women demand equal rights with men and that that right is enacted into law, the time will never come when men can deal with women at arm's length as they deal with men," declared Circuit Judge William B. Brown yesterday, when he sentenced Benjamin Weis, a stock salesman, to pay a fine of \$15 and costs of \$15 for violation of the blue sky law.

Weis' manager, Molen D. Myer, paid a fine of \$75 and costs of \$25 in superior court for the same offense.

Complaint was made by Mrs. Hattie Bancroft of Alto, who said Weis visited her home and induced her to hand over to him stock in the Petroleum Portland Cement company as "collateral" for preferred stock of the Chicago Steel Wheel company. She asserted that although Myer's agent told her the cement stock would be held only until the Chicago stock, listed on the New York exchange, rose to a price that would enable the brokers and her to "clear" on the sale, the salesman disposed of her securities.

Both men admitted a technical responsibility created by a new law which provides that even New York exchange stock must be approved by the Michigan commission before it may be offered for sale. The firm made restitution with Mrs. Bancroft who told the judges the situation was caused through a misunderstanding.

"A clever stock salesman goes out into the country and finds a woman minding her own business, and she is busy at it," said Judge Brown in presenting an illustration to Weis. "She is not familiar with and cannot be expected to be as familiar as men are with the intricacies of stock deals." The salesman cannot deal with such a woman on equal terms with men. The fact that he isn't understood is evidence that he isn't make himself clear and in such a case, I think the benefit of the doubt should be given the woman rather than the skillful agent. When a salesman goes out and deals with women, he must deal in terms they understand."—Grand Rapids Herald.

Barcophagus of Alexander the Great

One of the greatest masterpieces of ancient art is the sarcophagus of Alexander the Great. It was discovered in 1868 by men who were excavating near Sidon. It is constructed from a pure white block of Parian marble, eleven feet long, five and three-fourths feet wide and four and one-half feet high, and is ornamented by a tall caryatid porch that high. The relief sculpture on the front represents a charge of Alexander.

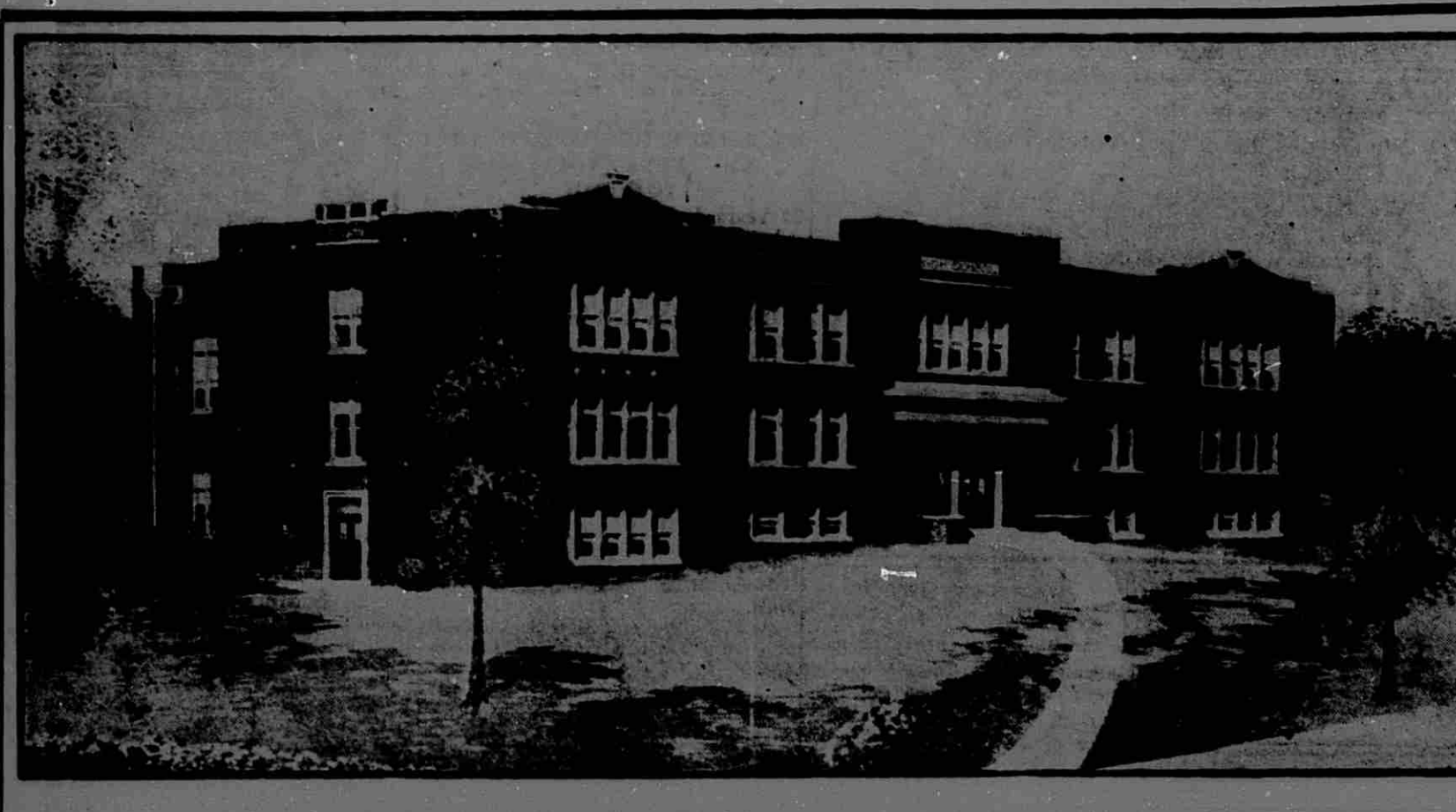

Monday, when the Ledger pencil shaver noted in for an item of news, he found a healthy looking shipment of crated cabs ready for the foot-cars to broadcast over the United States, carrying the fame of Uncle Sam's best finished baby carriage from coast to coast and from lakes to gulf.

Pick Detroit-Gd. Haven Route

PRESENT ROADS TO BE WIDENED TO 100 FEET. MISSES LOWELL

The route through Kent county of the proposed 100-foot concrete pavement to be built next year from Detroit to Grand Haven was disclosed yesterday to the county road commission, when it was asked by the state highway department to assist in obtaining certain information relative to additional right-of-way which must be acquired.

The route enters Kent county from the east over the South Lowell or Portland road and runs directly west to a point one mile north of Alto where it joins M-39 and runs north-easterly to M-16 at the blacksmith shop at the end of concrete on the Ada road. The highway then runs east past the Cascade Hills Country Club and enters Grand Rapids on Robinson road. It passes out of Grand Rapids on Leonard st. at the westerly city limits and follows the Marine road to the county line. Of this highway, the portion west of the city and that portion east of Grand Rapids to the blacksmith shop, is now paved. Sixteen miles of new pavement must be built. The present roads are 66 feet wide. The additional 34 feet will be taken from one or both sides, as conditions require.

A. Melick, bridge engineer for the state highway department, notified the commission the estimated cost of the proposed four-foot cantilever walk for pedestrians alongside the Ada-Lowell bridge over Grand Haven is \$2,300, and that the state will expect the county to meet the expense if the project is undertaken. The commission deferred action until it can communicate with the Ada township board.

Assistant Prosecutor Fred P. Geib submitted to the commission an opinion relative to a question referred to him regarding the period a road must be opened and traveled by the public before it automatically becomes a public highway and transfers to the jurisdiction of the township through which it passes. "No matter how long a road is opened and traveled by the public, it does not in any case automatically become a public highway," ruled the counsel. "But if the road is used continuously for 10 years or more by the general public in such a manner as to require a permission to so use the land by the owner, and there is also some act on the part of the township authorities indicating an acceptance on their part of the highway, as by repairing the road or making improvements thereon, such use for 10 years or more, coupled with acceptance by the township authorities in the manner indicated, constitutes the road a public highway. The township cannot be compelled to expend any money on such a road if it does not wish to do so."

The commission notified-Kent City officials that the concrete traffic post in the center of the village must be removed and suggested that four traffic guides, not more than four inches in height, might be placed above the pavement. Washington Bosc, a director of school district No. 2, Algonia township, asked that action be taken to prevent injury to children attending the Edgerton school on M-13. It was stated several automobiles have recently plunged into the school yard, which is below the surface of the road.

The road men completed plans for their annual picnic to be held Saturday at Myers lake. An invitation to attend has been extended to every member of the board of supervisors. Possibilities of developing the lower Ada road, from Cascade to Ada, along Thornapple river, as a scenic highway, are being considered by the road commission as a result of a petition submitted by Supervisor Ira Dean of Cascade township, for the county to take over the road. The petition has been referred to Engineer O. S. Hess.

Supervisor Melville B. McPherson of Vergennes township accepted an offer of the road commission to take over the road from Bailey church on the Vergennes road, running south one mile, east two and three-quarters miles and southeasterly to the Lowell village limits, upon payment by the township of \$1,300.—Grand Rapids Herald.
