

PAVED HIGHWAY STUBBORN-LY OPPOSED The Ionia Board of Supervisors on Tuesday in a resolution presented by Supervisor L. C. David, of Boston township, went on record as uphold-ing the stand taken by the Ionia County Road Commission in its ob-jections to the rerouting of M 16 through the county as proposed by the governor and commending the stand of the county commissioners as presented by Chairman Fred W. Green that M16 be paved as orginal-ly built through Portland, Ionia and Saranac, thence to Grand Rapids. They also refused to approve the compromise plan of cementing this route and the one going three miles south of Saranac on account of the expense which was estimated to be \$400,000. The commission did not recommend the two roads and the board by an unanimous vote, said they would not consider the building of another road through a section in which three improved roads are now within a distance of eight miles, and the new road not to traverse any portion of the county that would care for any part of the Ionia county traffic. — Ionia county tax pavers are to be LY OPPOSED
