"Quo warranto proceedings to inquire by what right Perry Carl Peckham continues to hold office as a member of the board of education of the village of Lowell were instituted in circuit court yesterday by Miss Grace B. Walker, a Christian Science practitioner of that village, who maintains she was elected as Peckham's successor at the last annual election, July 9.

A few days later, Miss Walker says, she received from Mr. Springett a notice from the board that there was no election of a qualified trustee to succeed Peckham.

Lowell people will wonder, probably, why suit has been brought against Mr. Peckham instead of the School Board. Apparently, he is chargeable only with a willful act to give the public an unrequested service. The reason, we presume, is a legal one.
