Ionian and Lowell Present M 16

A delegation of Lowell citizens joined with others from Ionia Tuesday in a dinner and hearing at the Association of Commerce building in Grand Rapids before Secretaries Bierce and others of that association, in behalf of Ionia and Lowell in protest against the re-routing of M. 16 or the building of the proposed air line 100-foot paved way through the open country regardless of the populous cities and towns over the route formerly followed and now largely paved.

Mr. Hale of Ionia presented the case for the present M. 16 route population in plain but convincing arguments and a presentation of unanswerable facts, in which he was ably supported by Mr. Look of Lowell and others.

The belief having been expressed that the air-line was too far developed for effective opposition, Mr. Look read the following letter, which is self-explanatory:

Lansing, Sept. 28, 1923.
Hon. D. G. Look,
Lowell, Michigan.
Dear Mr. Look:—

Your letter of August 31st addressed to the Governor has been referred to this office for reply.

Just at the present time it seems that the new route of M-16 through Ionia county is very uncertain. It was the desire of the Federal Government and this Department to route M-16 following the Grand river route in Clinton county in a north-westerly direction to intersect with a road parallel with and one mile north of the present gravel road running due west of Portland, thence west to Cascade in Kent county.

Since this road does not meet with the approval of Ionia County, it is very uncertain if anything will be done this year.

Earl Wright of the Ionia Sentinel presented a resolution adopted by the Ionia Association of Commerce, approved by the Ionia city Council and Ionia County Board of Supervisors in behalf of the established M. 16 route.

Secretary Bierce announced that he would present the matter and the views expressed to the Association of Commerce and to Wholesalers of Grand Rapids and would report at another hearing to be given soon.

In the meantime, Ionia's live wires will be working with St. Johns and other cities and towns along the route to the east, a movement in which the Lowell Village Council and Board of Trade might well take a hand.
