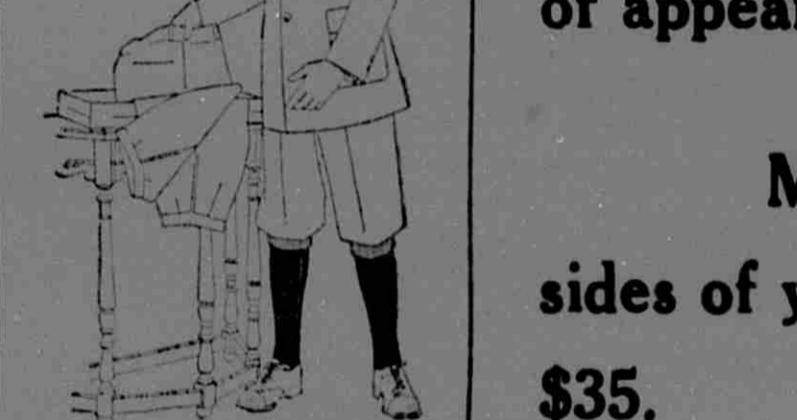

OBITUARY--CHAS. E. HACKETT. Charles E. Hackett, son of Thomas and Hannah Hackett, was born in Eaton county, Michigan, in 1847. His childhood was spent on the farm and attending school in the old log schoolhouse. His father sold the farm and moved to Charlotte and there Charles attended the Academy. He then worked at carriage and sign painting for three and a half years. He served for 31 years as foreman in some of the leading factories in Michigan. On October 5, 1871, he was united in marriage to Elizabeth Pearson and they lived a happy life for 49 years. During this time he had learned portrait and landscape painting in oil colors and he spent much time in teaching this art. The Methodist Episcopal church was their home for many years and he was class leader, treasurer, district steward and superintendent of the Sunday school. He was township clerk of Napoleon township for two terms. In 1922 he painted a life-size portrait of Abraham Lincoln and it now hangs in the capitol at Lansing. He came to live in this place May 1, 1924, and his wife passed away June 3, a month later. Since then he has resided here applying himself to his painting until the time of his death Sept. 25, 1923. He leaves to mourn his death one brother, E. E. Hackett, in whose family he lived. There are also five nephews who will mourn him. This obituary was written by himself for this occasion. Funeral services were held from the home, E. E. Hackett, two miles east of Edmore, last Friday afternoon, by the Rev. C. S. Barfield. Interment was made in Vinewood cemetery.--Edmore Times. Mr. and Mrs. Hackett were well respected residents of Lowell for a number of years.
