M-21 TOWNS REPORT M-16

FLINT, OWOSSO AND ST. JOHNS FRIENDLY TO "M 16 AS IS."

Members of a committee, made up of residents of the cities and towns on M-16, between Portland and Grand Rapids, visited Flint, Owosso and St. Johns Wednesday, for the purpose of interesting business men of these cities in the effort now being made to have M-16 as now laid out continued as the main trunk line between Lansing and Grand Rapids. They returned well pleased with interest shown by these towns and expect to receive support from all of them.

These cities are located on M-21, which merges with M-16 at Ionia. They are anxious to have a paved way into Grand Rapids as are the towns on M-16. With the latter route paved the next step would probably be that of paving M-21 to Ionia.

At Flint the committee were guests of lunch given in the handsome new Hotel Durant. There, L. H. Hale, chairman of the committee, addressed the Flint men, explaining the situation and inviting their aid. A number of questions were asked and Flint's attitude was encouraging. Council has already been laid between Flint and Owosso, in the direction of Ionia.

On the return trip, stops were made at Owosso and St. Johns where committees from business men's organizations met with the tourists. At Owosso the meeting was in the armory and was presided over by Otto Sprague. It was of an informal character. Maps were spread on a table, the proposed routes pointed out, and a comprehensive view given of the situation.

The party arrived at St. Johns at the supper hour and were met by Hon. Coleman C. Vanden, former secretary of state. The visitors were not permitted to pay for their supper, though it had not been a part of the original program to eat at St. Johns. Early in the evening they were escorted to Masonic hall, where C. P. Clark, editor of the St. Johns News, Editor Marshall, of the Clinton County Republican, and others took part in an informal discussion and reflected the interest that all St. Johns business men have in a cement road to Grand Rapids. There, as in the other cities, there were offers of aid in bringing the case before the state administrative board.

A date will be arranged for a hearing at Lansing, in the very near future and all members are hopeful it will bring results.

There were nearly 20 in the party. Those representing the Flint, Owosso, St. Johns and St. Johns, former secretary of state, president of the board of commerce; Lorenzo Webber, Chester M. Divine and Fred J. Mauren. The Portland party joined the committee from Ionia, Saranac and Lowell at Ionia at 2:00 p. m., and left the party at the same point late in the evening—Portland Review.

COUNTY REPLACING DROUGHT-STRICKEN TREES

Planting of 4,000 seedlings on the county work farm to replace trees killed by last summer's drought is now under way under direction of the state department of agriculture and L. C. Palmer, forestry warden of the Kent county road commission. The seedlings include maples, red and white oaks, walnut and sweet chestnut, these trees taking the place of Norway spruce which was killed. It is expected to plant an additional white pine and spruce next spring.

400 boys visited Grand Rapids in educational tours.

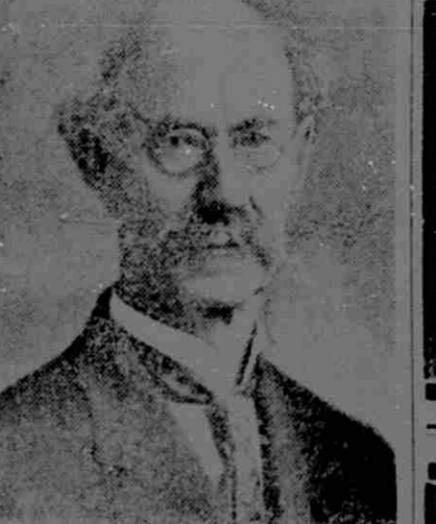
