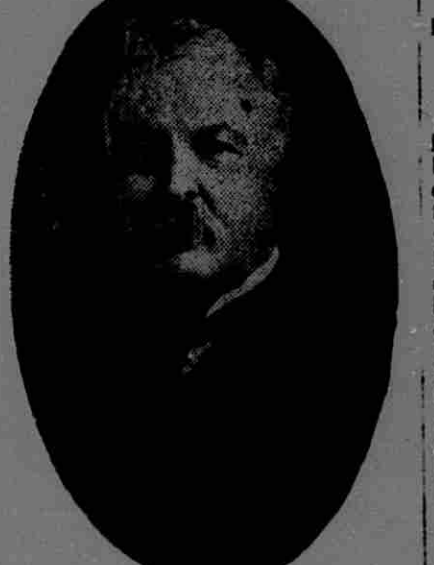

AN OLD PIONEER MERCHANT GONE



Samuel E. Sweetland, an old-time Lowell merchant, passed away Nov. 27, aged 85 years, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. B. Merriman, at 717 Stoking ave., Grand Rapids, where he had made his home for the past 15 years. Funeral services were held at Yetter's chapel, Lowell, November 30. Rev. H. H. Harris officiating clergyman, and the body was laid to rest in Oakwood cemetery.

Mr. Sweetland was born in Michigan City, Ind., April 19, 1838. He came to Lowell from Elmira, N. Y., in 1866 and entered the grocery business in the old "Checked Front" store with Joe Smith, in which he continued for a number of years.

In 1866, also, he married Della D. Wickham, who died Oct. 13, 1891. Five children were born, one of whom died in infancy. Those left to mourn his loss are Sam, G., of Portland, Ore.; Burr H., of Detroit; Pearl B., of Alvinston, Ont.; and Julia D., of Grand Rapids; also two grand-children, Della and Marion Sweetland, and two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Thayer of Rockford, Ill., and Mrs. Phaedra of Elmira, N. Y.

Mr. Sweetland built the livery barn now occupied by William Beaver and conducted the same many years. In later life he was associated with A. P. Ayres in the marble business and still later with Joseph Hamilton.

SHOT AT PAT BOWES FAILS

LOWELL VILLAGE MARSHAL HAS NARROW ESCAPE FROM NIGHT ASSASSIN.

Some unknown person fired a bullet through the front window of Pat Bowes' home at 830 last Friday evening, narrowly missing the intended victim, who was heard, but not seen, in the darkness blundering into a wire fence and breaking through a tangle of wild grape vines in the direction of an automobile a few rods distant, the engine of which was running and which dashed away in the direction of Grand Rapids as the fugitive sprang upon the running board.

The bullet crashed through the window, through an open plastered door and the papered and plastered wall of the stairway and fell to the beam below, where it was found.

Mr. Bowes probably owes his life or freedom from injury to the fact that at the instant of the crash he had turned to put a record on his phonograph; and he relates with a twinkle of Irish wit, that the record he selected was "Nearer, My God, to Thee." Probably he was "Nearer" than he cared to be, just at that moment.

Sheriff Smith was notified and has spent considerable time in investigation.

He stated to a Herald reporter that there is little doubt that the shooting could be attributed to Bowes' activity against liquor law violators in and around Lowell, as frequent threats of violence have been made. He further stated that he believed the man was but a few feet from the window when the shot was fired.

COURT IS LENIENT WITH JOE BOWLER

Expressing a hope that Joseph Bowler will "come back," forsake his former ways and begin a new life which will become ultimately successful, Circuit Judge Dunham yesterday sentenced the defaulting employee of the Farmer's State bank at Alto to the Jania reformatory for a term of 18 months to 10 years. The minimum term was recommended.

"I do not believe you are a criminal at heart," said the court in passing sentence. "Your return from Texas and your ready confession of your thefts have won for you a leniency which a hardened criminal could not expect." Judge Dunham said that Bowler's mother lives, had urged him to deal mercifully with the youth. Bowler was a teller and bookkeeper of the bank. He obtained \$1,500, it was said.—Grand Rapids Herald, Dec. 2.

HABEAS CORPUS WRIT FREES IONIA GUARD WHO SHOT SODMAN

Jonah, Dec. 1.—Truman Rolfe, Michigan reformatory guard, was released from the county jail here today on a writ of habeas corpus. Rolfe has been in jail for three weeks, following the shooting of Benny Sodman near the reformatory, while Rolfe was halting automobiles in search of an escaped convict. Sodman is in Grand Rapids hospital paralyzed, the bullet having entered his spine.

No charge has been lodged against Rolfe, who is to appear in circuit court Monday when arguments of his petition for a writ of habeas corpus will be heard.—Grand Rapids Herald Dec. 2.

SHOT AT PAT BOWES FAILS

LOWELL VILLAGE MARSHAL HAS NARROW ESCAPE FROM NIGHT ASSASSIN.

Some unknown person fired a bullet through the front window of Pat Bowes' home at 8300 last Friday evening, narrowly missing the intended victim, who grabbed his revolver, rushed to the porch and emptied his gun in the direction of the escaping assassin, who was heard, but not seen, in the darkness blind-ering into a wire fence and breaking through a tangle of wild grape vines in the direction of an automobile a few rods distant, the engine of which was running and which dashed away in the direction of Grand Rapids as the fugitive sprang upon the running board.

The bullet crashed through the window, through an open doorway and the papered and plastered wall of the stairway and fell to the beam below, where it was found.

Mr. Bowes probably owes his life or freedom from injury to the fact that at the instant of the crash he had turned to put a record on his phonograph and he relates with a twinkle of Irish wit, that the record he selected was "Nearer, My God to Thee." Probably he was "Nearer" than he cared to be, just at that moment.

Sheriff Smith was notified and has spent considerable time in investigation. He stated to a Herald reporter that there is little doubt that the shooting could be attributed to Bowes' activity against liquor law violators in and around Lowell, and frequent threats of violence have been made. He further stated that he believed the man was but a few feet from the window when the shot was fired.
