SMALLPOX ON THE RAMPAGE

Lansing, Dec. 31.—Smallpox is spreading in Michigan, according to the State Department of Health. During November the disease confined itself almost entirely to Wayne, Hillsdale, Shiawassee, Ottawa and Jackson counties, but now it is breaking out in neighboring and adjacent counties as well. Lenawee is one, and its presence there is accounted for by the fact that the county lies between Jackson and Hillsdale counties. Smallpox is highly infectious, and spreads rapidly where population is denseat. For that reason it exists mostly in southern Michigan.

Coincident with the spread of smallpox, an increase is noted. During November 417 cases were reported to the Department of Health. Last year the figure was 97, and the average for November of the past ten years is 181. The first 19 days of December saw 299 cases reported as compared with 145 for the same time interval in December 1922.

The increase and spread of smallpox in Michigan is entirely preventable. There is no excuse for its existence anywhere. Through the simple medium of vaccination the scourge can be entirely eliminated. Counties that have smallpox right along, must be full of backward people, else they would avail themselves of the fruits of modern enlightenment to stop the uncalled for spread of disease.



Heirs of Land in Ionia County Oppose Robuilding Plan.


Ionia Dec. 23.—Who owns the plot of ground on section 17 of Orleans township on which the Green church was built 51 years ago? A legal battle is in the making.

The charch has been without a regular pastor for two years and the trustees have sold the building, which it is intended to move to Easton township and convert into a residence. The building is a landmark located on a corner of a much traveled highway and nearby land owners want it preserved.

The original title provides that when the property ceases to be used for church purposes it shall revert to the grantor or his heirs. The heirs are in possession and say they will fight it out in the courts.

LEGAL 'AID' BOON TO POOR SAVES MANY LAWSUITS.

Grand Rapids Bureau, in Third Year Handles 400 Cases in 6 Months.
Through the Legal Aid bureau now in its third year, "equality be fore the law," largely a myth a few years ago, has become a reality for those who cannot afford to employ an attorney to handle their legal questions.

More than 400 persons have plied to the bureau for help dur the last six months, according Mrs. Jane Mulder, secretary of bureau. The majority of the cases have been settled out of colitication being utilized only a last resort. About \$1,700 was elected by the bureau, which effect settlement of disputes. All of

was collected for or saved to clients in small amounts, often as low as 50 cents. But each case gets the attention of Attorney William K. Clute, the bureau's legal aide.

"Fifty cents to a poor man means as much as \$50,000 to a rich man," says Mrs. Mulder, in explaining why even the smallest amounts are given as much attention as cases in which much money is involved.

The most common complaint is: "He won't pay me what he owes me." Reconciliation is reached in most cases when the employer and the employe are brought together. Many troubles between landlord and tenant are settled. Numerous domestic scraps are aired in Mrs. Mulder's tiny office and happiness often is brought out of misunderstanding and misery that otherwise might lead to divorce. Alimony dodders are brought to justice and widows and orphans are aided in every possible manner.—[Detroit Free Press.
