PHILLIP REUTELSTRE PASSED GAIN OF \$4,706,704.00 IN INSUR-AWAY ALONE. LIVED IN ANCE—CASH BALANCE ON LOWELL 54 YEARS HAND IS \$306,630.47

Saturday evening, the frozen body of Phil Reutelster, 54 years a respected resident of Lowell and nearly 80 years old, was found on the floor of his home in this village where it had evidently lain for twenty-four

His neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Gunn noticed that the usual clearing away of snow from steps and paths had not been done, looked into the house and saw the body on the floor and called Mr. and Mrs. John Lewis. Then Deputy Sheriff Bowes was called, entrance into the locked house forced and Dr. Gotfred sea and Justice Andrews were called.

It was evident that death had resulted from apoplexy or heart failure and that Mr. Reutelster, who lived alone, had not moved since he fell.

PAVED WAY PROJECT WILL COST \$1,000,000 IN IONIA COUNTY, ACCORDING TO FIGURES

The Ionia committee which has been considering the proposed rerouting of M-16 over the road seven miles south of Ionia, as proposed by the state highway department, and which has been carrying on an acwhich has been carrying on an active campaign in favor of the present routing of M-16, were in receipt this morning of figures and provisions relative to the Covert road act, under which petitions are understood to have been circulated and signed by property owners along the proposed paved way.

These figures and provisions as presented to the conditions which surround Covert act road building as shown by the records of roads that have been built.

According to the understanding locally of the state's own estimates of the cost of building the proposed paved way, the project in Ionia county will cost \$1,000,000.

The committee is also informed that regardless of all arguments, all Covert act roads built in the county up to date have been financed approximately on the following basis: Fifty per cent to the county, 25 per cent to the district.

That road No. 352 the longest and

o the district.

That road No. 352, the longest and highest priced Covert act road in this part of the state was handled entirely by the state and was assessed 50 per cent to the two counties, Ionia and Kent, 25 per cent to the townships, and 25 per cent to the district.

That in no case has the state over

That in no case has the state ever paid or agreed to pay more than 25 per cent on a Covert act road and this only in the way of state reward, and in about 90 per cent of the cases it has been a case of I-owe-you, as he state now owes the county over the state now owes the county over \$125,000 in state reward money for Covert act roads already completed and there are no available funds in the state treasury to pay this amount, and the county has been given no idea as to when it may expect payment of the amounts due, if ever.

That after 60 per cent of the abutting property owners sign a Covert

That after 60 per cent of the abutting property owners sign a Covert act petition and present it properly to the state highway department, the matter is entirely out of their hands, only as to the payment of the cost, and the state can assess the county, township and district as they see fit, and, as the state is paying no rewards, the whole burden of paying the cost could fall upon the paying the cost could fall upon the

per cent of the cost of this project, no doubt every taxpayer in the county would realize that a road was being built; should 25 per cent be assessed against the township would have no reason to doubt that a road was being built; should 25 per cent be assessed against the district, the taxpayers can figure it out with a view to determining whether they would care to live in that district. The committee is informed, also, that, regardless of the promises as to percentages and costs, these are

that, regardless of the promises as to percentages and costs, these are the recorded percentages as they have been assessed on all Covert act roads.

The Ionia county road commission has received information to the effect that Frank C. Freeman, a resident of South Boston, has been circulating petitions during the past few days, asking for a Covert act road along the highway, seven miles south of Ionia, and known as the road over which the proposed M-16 pavedway has been laid out by the state highway department. According to the reports received by the county road commission, out of 15 property owners along the west end property owners along the west end of the road, 13 have signed the petitions, which it is stated have been circulated by Mr. Freeman for the state highway department.—Ionia Sentinel-Standard, Jaunary 26.


