Mrs. Warren Shepard's frozen body was found en the bed in her home two miles west of Lowell on M-16, Tuesday forenoon after the passing of Rural Mall Carrier George Lee, who noticed that her mail had no been taken from the box since Saturday and reported same to the next neighbor on the route.
Deputy Sheriff Bowes was called and the body was discovered on the bed, though before gaining entrance it was necessary to shoot the savage bull dog which occupied the home with the lone woman and assumed a war-like aspect, from his place on the bed by her dead body.
Justice A. M. Andrews was called in capacity of coroner and the Yeiter Undertakers took charge of the body.
A pail containing Paris green and a glass in which some of the poison had been mixed were found together with a card which mentioned troubles over property matters but was unaddressed and unsigned but began "You people"—
The officers deemed no inquest necessary—cause of death being very evident.

Mr. Shepard died in November and his estate is in charge of the Grand Rapids Trust company and is being probated.

ILL FATED CAR WHICH PLUNG-ED THROUGH THE ICE

IS RAISED On Tuesday, morning, January 8th, Ray VanGilder and Howard Gould went fishing through the ice, or or rather started out to go fishing through the ice at Pine Island lake, but at the time that they started out, they had no idea that before they were through with it, they would be fishing through the same ice for the automobile, belonging to Gould, which had transported them to the lake.

It will be remembered, however, that the car was run to a point on the lake opposite of what is known as the Byrnes landing, where it plunged through about two inches of ice into twenty-two feet of water, with Gould, who had some difficulty in extricating himself and narrowly escaped going to the bottom with the

The boys have been waiting ever singe the car took the plunge for a favorable opportunity to raise the car, but owing to the fact that we have had s'o many heavy falls of snow this has been impossible until about a week ago last Monday, Feburary 4th, the first attempt was made to reach the lake and by a lot of dilligent effort on the part of the boys this was finally accomplished and the first steps were taken towards getting the necessary equipment to the lake in readiness for the work in hand.

Another heavy fall of snow tied up the work of rescue for a few days, but they got at it Thursday morning bright and early and everything possible that could be done was done to eliminate any trouble when the car had been hooked. It is presumed that the car stood in the mud on its nose, for when they hooked it, they caught it by the spare tire rim on the back of the machine, and the tire was promptly punctured, but the hook hung to the rim and the car was raised with a derrick and a chain hoist.

Work was suspended Thursday night on account of darkness, with the car hanging in the air, held by the spare tire rim and planks were placed under it to prevent its going back into the lake, should anything give way in the night, but it seems that all was well the next day, Friday, when the boys returned to resume the work where they had left off and with a great deal of manuvering it was brought safely to land and the work of towing the car back to the city was begun.
