LOWELL TEAM VICTORIOUS

DEFEAT MT. PLEASANT, ALMA AND IONIA IN BASKET BALL CONTEST

Returning from a victorious contest with the High school basket ball teams of three larger cities, Lowell's husky boys were greeted by an enthusiastic crowd of cheering admirers, who provided decorated conveyance and a hilarious escort through Main street. Afterward the boys were treated by Lowell business men to chicken dinner at Harry's restaurant.

The story of their championship winning is told by the High school reporter as follows:
The local high school basket ball leads sprang a surprise upon themselves and Mt. Pleasant last week by smashing their way to victory thru three of the most strenuous games the tournament officials could offer them. Mt. Pleasant High and Alma were considered by many as the most likely winners of the tournament and when Lowell drew Mt. Pleasant for the first game there was much rejoicing in the enemies' camp and a lot of troubled looks on the brows of our local lads. Here is the dope. If Lowell could win from Mt. Pleasant, its chances for the tournament were indeed brighter; but Alma loomed as the big contender. By going into the game with the determination to fight from the first to the last whistle, Lowell came through with a one point margin victory. The Mt. Pleasant boys came on the floor with fire in their eyes and with a determination to win. Lowell was just as determined. Mt. Pleasant took the lead soon after the second half started by mid-court shot. The battle see-sawed with Mt. Pleasant having the advantage most of the time. With ten minutes to go, a tie score of 17 all, Weekes of Lowell dropped through a free throw, thus winning one of Lowell's most notable victories. The Mt. Pleasant students were disappointed; but showed manly sportsmanship by coming out in the next game and helping all they could for Lowell.

The Lowell-Mt. Pleasant contest ended at 6:15 p. m., and Lowell was scheduled to play against Alma at 7:30 p. m. After a light lunch and a good rubdown, the Lowellites faced the Alma team at 7:29 p. m. During the first half of this game, Lowell showed the effects of its former tussle with Mt. Pleasant by being slow to start the offense. After a ten minute rest between halves, the Lowell lads came out stronger than ever and simply ran away with the contest. Alma failed to score a single field basket during the third quarter and first half of the last quarter. Lowell, tired and having a 25-5 score, let Alma do as much shooting as it pleased. The game ended with a 25-10 score in favor of Lowell. This was the largest score any team made in the tournament.

Alma drew a bye in the first round and in the second round won from Midland in a close contest, thus putting them in the finals against Lowell. The Lowell-Ionia game was figured to be the biggest and closest contest of all the tournament. Ionia had a team built around Hood, its star forward. The remark was heard that Lowell does not have any star player, but all five were good. Lewis of Lowell played against Hood of Ionia and so completely out-classed this star performer that Hood was held to one lonely field basket during the entire game. Lowell's offense was so strong that Ionia was simply dazed by its speed and when it came to defensive work, Lewis and Fineis were there with the goods. Captain Flogaus led his men through the three victories in great fashion, knowing when to use a smashing offense and when to play a delayed defensive game. Weekes at center, though not as tall as most of his opponents, was able to get the tip-off most of the time and played a great defensive game as well as helping the forwards with the offense. Schneider, as a running mate to Captain Flogaus, showed he has a real eye for the hoop by making five field goals in the Alma game. The Lowell team work and old fighting spirit was what brought the lads through the tournament to victory.

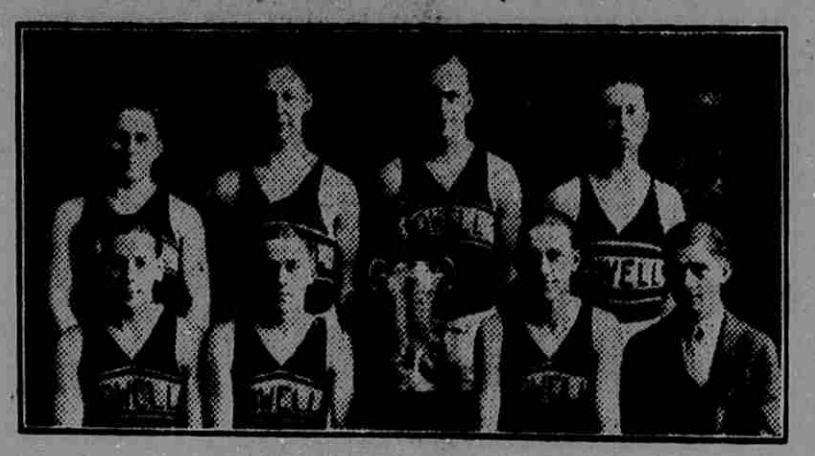
A violin duet, "Winnona Melody," by Miss Vivian Haysner and Lester Manger, accompanied by Mrs. Haysner.

OLD RESIDENT DIED QUICKLY

Albert Shepard, aged 78, of Lowell was found dead in his row-boat on Grand river by Clarence Reuteler, Tuesday morning at 10:30. Justice Andrews was summoned and decided an inquest was unnecessary. The body was taken to Yelter's chapel.

Mr. Shepard was seen by neighbors when he was on his way down to the river on a trapping trip. Heart failure evidently overtook him when he leaned over to unlock his boat, for one hand was on his pocket when he had reached for his key, and he was in a kneeling position over the lock.

Mr. Shepard was an old Lowell resident, having lived in the same house over forty years and was a deputy sheriff for many years. He was born in Ada, and came to Lowell when a young man. Mr. Shepard never married, but leaves one brother, Hiram Shepard of Ada, and four nephews and a niece to mourn their loss.
